Further Protests Planned To New Cub Regulations

As opposition to the P.E.I. Temperance Commission's new regulations covering the operation of club rooms, copies of the regulations were received by most clubs throughout the province over the weekend.

Assessing the effects of these regulations on their organizations, officials of the Royal Canadian Legion and other military and veterans organizations are in the process of preparing briefs for presentation to the executive council.

The new regulations cover such things as the sale of spirits and beer to persons under 21; bar hours; guest lists; admission of guests; disorderly conduct and intoxication; live entertainment; club seating capacity; gambling; the appointment of managers for all clubs; and many other items.

Violation of any of the regulations, which will be enforced by club managers and inspectors, who have free access to any club at any time, will result in a suspension or cancellation of the special permit under which the clubs operate.

Meanwhile, it has been learned that several meetings are to be held this weekend, as the Legion and veterans organizations prepare defences that will be presented to the Executive Council, possibly Tuesday.

Keen Demand Found For Island Cheese

"I found a keen demand in the Halifax area for Prince Edward Island cheddar cheese," Dairy Superintendent H.J. MacDonald, Charlottetown, said yesterday afternoon as he was returning from a week at the Atlantic Winter Fair.

Mr. MacDonald joined with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick counterparts to staff a co-operative booth sponsored by the Maritime Dairy Foods Service Bureau to help publicize all Maritime dairy products. They sold milk at five cents a glass and three in for free a generous slice of cheddar cheese with a few soda biscuits.

Many of the fair visitors exclaimed over the flavor and general palatability of the Island cheese and asked "why don't we ever get it in our Halifax stores?"

The dairy superintendent also got the impression, he said, that Prince Edward Island dairy products in general are not advertised widely enough, though he did add that the Island's dairy products always sell readily.

"There is never any problem marketing them," he emphasized.

Retired S'ide Postmaster Dies At 67

SUMMERSIDE — Charles J. Peters, the person who served the most years in Canadian postal service history, died in Summerside Sunday in his 68th year.

He joined the Summerside postal staff in 1909, became postmaster in 1922 and retired in 1952, having served 53 years, longer than anyone else in the Dominion.

Active in sporting circles, Mr. Peters took part in hockey, golf and curling and was a leader in the development of Summerside minor baseball.

He spent all his life in Summerside and is survived by his brother Walter.
