# Pope's United Nations Visit Praised in European Papers

**LONDON (AP)**—Pope Paul's visit to the United Nations in New York generally won praise in West European newspapers Tuesday. Behind the Iron Curtain the response was mixed.

The Soviet press printed only terse accounts of Monday's unprecedented papal journey and the only comment came from the government newspaper Izvestia. It charged President Johnson purposely went to New York to meet the Pope in an effort to increase U.S. prestige.

While Pope Paul's peace appeal at the UN was praised guardedly in Czechoslovakia, it was criticized in Hungary as hardly suitable for solving world problems.

In Britain, newspapers devoted large amounts of space to the Pope's day in New York. The Irish Independent asked: "Did the world really listen to what was said at the United Nations yesterday? It has been before now the lot of the Pope to be disregarded when he appealed for peace to leaders and people. Someone has got to take the first step after the appeal."

Paris newspapers used their biggest type and published huge pictures.

In The Post interview, Friedman, 42, did not disclose the Argentine location.
