PENSIONS PROBLEMS SLATED FOR DISCUSSION ON SEPT. 9

OTTAWA (CP) - Policy problems as well as technical details of the new Canada Pension Plan will be discussed with provincial delegations at a conference opening here Sept. 8. If the provinces agree, Prime Minister Pearson, who issued the invitation last Monday, says the discussions will be "fairly technical," but it is impossible to separate questions of policy from them.

Mr. Pearson's letter of invitation, sent to provincial premiers when they were meeting in Halifax, was made public by his office Thursday.

Chairman of the conference will be Health Minister J. LaMarsh.

Mr. Pearson told reporters Thursday that if the premier wish, the question of unemployment can also be the subject of federal-provincial talks at the same time. The premier suggested such a discussion at their Halifax conference.

Mr. Pearson said the pension plan talks probably would require two days, but might be necessary to continue for a third day, until Sept. 11.
