The engineer and fireman of each engine were killed. Their names are: James Sproull, engineer; Michael O'Brien, engineer; W. G. Henderson, fireman; John R. McKenzie, fireman.

A Mr. Cameron, of Scotch Hill, a passenger, was killed, and another passenger, John McMillan, of Pictou, was injured.

NEW DEPARTURE IS EXPECTED.

In the Fast Line Arrangements.

CARTWRIGHT MAY MAKE CERTAIN CONDITIONS.

Having Boats Call at Halifax, and Connect with fast trains.

OTTAWA, Sept. 28.—In connection with the Fast Line matter it is quite possible that a surprise may be sprung in the shape of a new departure.

It is on the tapis that Cartwright may declare that no fast line negotiations can be satisfactorily concluded as long as vessels are required to ascend the Gulf of St. Lawrence and that in order to obtain a high rate speed, Halifax will have to be made the port of termination and vessels will have to be met there by trains capable of doing forty miles an hour, which will leave immediately on the arrival of the boats.

This, it is contended, will enable passengers to reach the Pacific coast and New York sooner than by direct line from Liverpool to New York.

EUROPE WATCHING FRANCE.

A Military Coup d'Etat would cause Little Surprise.

London, Sept. 26.—The alarming situation in France rivets the attention of Europe. The excitement is increasing hourly, new revelations and developments are expected, and a military coup d'etat would not surprise anybody.

The weakness of M. Brisson, the Premier, over the affairs of Lieut.-Col. Picquart, who is now in secret confinement in the military prison of Cherche Mida, placed there, apparently, without the knowledge of the Government, and in spite of the fact that he was in the hands of a civil court, has disgusted even his own personal friends, who call him a coward and a dolt, while the enemies of a revision of the Dreyfus case accuse him of being a hypocrite, and of having sold himself to a Dreyfus syndicate, an organization which undoubtedly exists.
