### THE WEEK AT S. D. U.

It seems as though Saint Dunstan's has just experienced a bit of a throw-back to the "good old days" so often recounted in tales of wonder by returning alumni. The days of imagination and organized hilarity are not yet dead on the campus, even though you might say that they are becoming fewer and farther between. Last week, we mentioned that there were just around the corner the annual elections for the principal executive positions in the Students' Union, and we also casually mentioned that the political machinery was a bit slow in starting here on the campus.

Well, the copy for that column was scarcely out of our hands when the pale of dormancy was shattered. For reasons that are probably best known by the individual members of the present Junior class, only one nomination was voiced for the position of the presidency. This nomination, signed by at least the ten required supporting students bore the name of George Mullally, and as this was the only bid received for the job, Mr. Mullally was declared elected to the presidency by acclamation.

The other positions, the vice-presidency and the secretary-treasurer, however, were not so easily won. Clothed at least mystically in the white of candidacy for the vice-presidency were: Charles Campbell, of A.A.A. fame as this year's hockey manager; Michael Quigley, the hard-working official currently at the reins of the W.U.S.C. Committee on the campus; and Michael Swift, the amiable president of the Sophomore class and enterprising go-getter in matters athletic (to ignore for a moment the academic).

Since these three men are all from the same class, it was thought that they would split their class pretty evenly, and would therefore have about the same number of immediate supporters to go about seeking votes for them. As things turned out though, Mike Swift thoroughly swept the field to rack up the required 50 per cent of the votes demanded in the election clauses of the Constitution. The tally sheet showed Swift out in front with 128 votes, Quigley next with 82 to his credit, and Campbell with 32.

So the quiet, soft-spoken Minto-man will be riding shotgun next season when the carriage of state is once again whipped into motion. Unlike many, perhaps even of the better informed, the crew on our end of the top cliff in Memorial thought Mike was a sure-shot from the very beginning, and so we add another note to the chorus of "Congratulations, Mike!"

### SPECTACULAR SHOW

Now in the contesting of the secretary-treasurer's chair, that's where all the color poured forth from a select group of imaginative minds to present a spectacle such as we haven't seen here for some time. Of course, many of the bizarre suggestions that were forth-

coming when election talk first began didn't pan out, still, if we might be permitted to say so, enough of them did stick to the proceedings to make it a lively one; let us explain.

Since this position may be filled either by a Senior or a Junior student, the present Junior Class (Incoming Senior Class) decided that since Mr. Henry Gaudel, member of this class and holder of the position this year, had had enough of ledgers and cheque-books, the man best suited for candidacy was logically Mr. John Conran. Against him, the younger class posed Jerry Burns. Since John had on many occasions during the year, in the regular public speaking classes and out of them, given ample evidence of his piquant tongue, fertile intellect, and governmental know-how, it was easy for his class-mates to see that he would be a perfect choice.
