NEW YORK (AP) — High space authorities have reported evidence of manned Russian space failures with parachutes as well as many as five or more cosmonaut fatalities, says the New York Journal-American.

The newspaper published its story as a federal space agency officials await a congressional subcommittee in Washington Friday that there have been Soviet failures, but refused to divulge any information on abortive Russian manned space efforts.

There has been an admission of manned Soviet space failures, but a "top secret" label has been placed on the number.

However, The Journal-American says, a Pentagon spokesman told of Russian space failures in a report that information on such failures could do major damage to intelligence apparatus through which data is obtained.

The daily quotes a congressional source:

The Journal-American says tracking stations, working with and for NASA, reported this record of Russian space efforts:

1. Cosmonaut Sergey Shobrin launched together in a Soyuz capsule, May 17, 1961. Launching signals heard and conversation monitored for a few minutes. Then silence.
2. Cosmonaut Piotr Dolgoy, launched Oct. 11, 1960. Signals heard for 30 minutes, then lost.
3. Cosmonaut Vasilievich Zorodovsky, launched April, 1961. Signals lost almost immediately after launching.
4. Two persons (one may have been female according to European intelligence reports) were launched together in a Soyuz capsule, May 17, 1961. Launching signals heard and conversation monitored for a few minutes. Then silence.

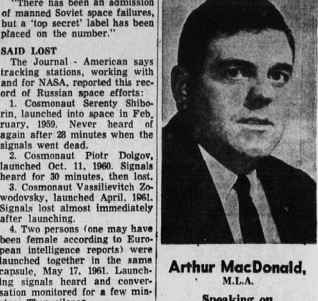
They were arrested shortly after the flag — while with the letters FLQ printed on it — was flying from a pole atop the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce building Saturday.

Rec Ensign Baked As Flag of Canada

By PATRICIA RUSAK VICTORIA (CP) — A resolution asking the federal government to name the Red Ensign the official flag of Canada was passed Monday by the national chapter of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire.

At its 63rd annual meeting here, the 29,000-member voluntary patriotic service organization reaffirmed its belief that the Red Ensign signifies Canada's multi-cultural heritage.

"Canadian citizens are particularly struck by the irony of their country's situation, when newly independent countries by their own flags," national president Mrs. Peter L. Robinson of Toronto said.

Several times since 1945, when an order-in-council permitted the Red Ensign to be flown from all federal government buildings, the order has asked for official endorsement of the flag.
