### Town Improvement Report Given Georgetown Council

GEORGETOWN — Work on George Street and Weeks Crescent was reported on by Mayor Howard S. MacLean at a recent meeting of the Georgetown Town Council.

Bushes have been cut away from the western half of George Street and machines have been working for some time on Weeks Crescent. Weeks Crescent will be 40 feet wide when completed.

Correspondence was read from Hon. Judy LaMarsh, J.P. Nicholson, and the executive assistant to the minister of immigration. The matter of the rink contract has been referred to a lawyer who will proceed to take the necessary action to collect the money owed on the contract.

It was decided that a new truck be purchased for use as a hose truck for the fire department. This matter had been discussed at earlier meetings and has now been finalized and delivery is to be made within a few days.

It was decided to have the telephone and electric poles in the town whitewashed and painted as has been done in previous years.

The question of sanitation conditions in certain areas of the town was discussed at some length and it was decided to contact the provincial department of health to ascertain if any assistance is available from that source to assist in cleaning up unsanitary yards and sewer outlets.

The council was informed that a considerable amount of work had been done on the town dump site but that irresponsible citizens had again continued to dump all over the area. It was again necessary to have a bulldozer clean up the site. This matter of non-cooperation by certain citizens was considered increasingly important if Georgetown is to attract new citizens.

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was awarded the Post-Graduate Travelling Fellowship. Licensed by the Presbytery of Westminster, British Columbia, Dr. Somers was ordained by the Presbytery of Toronto on May 4, 1939, and served for one year at Vancouver Heights Church. Returning east he entered Union Theological Seminary in New York for post-graduate work in the fields of Old Testament, Church History, Church Law and Liturgies, and while there was offered an assistant professorship in Old Testament in a Canadian theological seminary. CALLED TO KIRK

On securing his Master's degree in Theology, he returned to Canada and was called to the Kirk of St. James, Charlottetown, where he was inducted on Sept. 25, 1941.

He was part-time chaplain with the Royal Airforce during the World War II.

In 1945 Dr. Somers was elected moderator of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, and in 1947 Moderator of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. Since 1946 he was Clerk of the Presbytery and Treasurer of the Charlottetown Ministerial Association. He served on the General Assembly's Board of Administration, the Board of Education, and the Board of Knox College.

In 1947, Dr. Somers was holiday preacher at St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, and in 1951 at the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal.

In 1961 he was official delegate from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to the General Assembly of the Church in Scotland. He was also offered similar appointments to the General Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church in England, Ireland and Wales.

The Lucy Maud Montgomery Birthplace will be opened officially on the afternoon of July 1, by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell. The house on which the gifted island writer was born is situated at New London corner Time of the ceremony is 2:30 in the afternoon.

Premier Walter Shaw and his minister of tourist development, Lloyd G. MacPhail, have also been invited to attend.

Chairman of the Birthplace foundation is Lt. Col. J.E.W. Johnstone, Burlington, James T. Campbell, Park Corner, who owns the home in which several of the famous books were written, is also an officer of the foundation.

The local committee includes Mrs. Lorne Campbell and Mrs. Francis Murray, New London, and Mrs. Wilbur MacKay, Emerald RR 1.

The Kensington Lion's Band will be in attendance and refreshments will be in charge of the New London Women's Institute.

The birthplace of the famous writer—her books are known all over the world—is an added tourist attraction for the province.

The modest house at New London corner was sold at one time to an oil company, but K. C. Irving who built the Irving Oil empire, decided it back to the province. It has since been donated to the Lucy Maud Montgomery Birthplace Foundation.

## St. Peters Man Has Sweep Hope

Saturday, the day of the Irish Derby at Curragh, Ireland, could prove an exciting day for Ken "Bus" McCullum of St. Peters.

Mr. McCullum, 50, an employee with Canadian National Railways, holds an Irish Sweepstakes ticket on the horse Niksar, the fourth favorite at 10-1 odds.

He is with the ferry MV Scotia II, which is undergoing annual refit at the drydock in Halifax. His wife and family are at home in St. Peters.
