Refugees Get TB Treatment

OTTAWA (CP)—About 900 Hungarian refugees who arrived by ship at Saint John, N.B., in the last few weeks have received or are receiving treatment for varying degrees of tuberculosis, an immigration department official said Monday.

The official said the immigrants were known to be suffering from the disease when they boarded ship for Canada.

Under the federal government plan for admitting Hungarian refugees none is excluded because of TB, providing the immigrant is able to travel without danger to fellow passengers.

The immigration department official said all Hungarians with TB receive free treatment. As soon as they are well they are released from hospital but receive periodic examination at provincial TB centres.

Huge Iron Ore Deal In Labrador Comes To Light

ST. JOHN'S Nfld. (CP)—A deal spawned in melodramatic secrecy and involving a billion tons of iron ore in the earth of Labrador will come to light next week in the Newfoundland legislature.

Premier Smallwood, making his first statement on closed-door proceedings of the last few days at the Newfoundland Hotel here, said Tuesday night four pieces of legislation concerning the deal would be presented to the provincial House next week.

He said 27 lawyers here and in Montreal had been working for weeks to iron out wrinkles in the final form of the agreements. Ten major agreements were involved, he said.

Rumors were as thick as the

fog hanging over this seaport city Tuesday night but this much was known definitely:

The Newfoundland - Labrador corporation Nalco held an important stockholders meeting in St. John's Tuesday.

CONCERNS JAVELIN
Canadian Javelin Limited, which holds concessions to mine iron ore reserves at Wabush Lake in southwestern Labrador proven at 1,100,000 tons by government geologists is one of the major participants.

Javelin President John C. Doyle planned to leave St. John's today after a brief visit to consult with lawyers in Montreal.

The big ore company of Pickands Mather and Company of Cleveland is another major participant. Pickands Mather and Javelin lawyers have been working long hours in close secrecy in the hotel here.

The Newfoundland government is the third major party to the agreements but the Harriman-Ripley Company of New York is also involved.

INVOLVES VAST SUM
Authoritative sources said Tuesday night some of the largest iron and steel concerns in Canada and the United States had a direct interest in the negotiations, which involved capital running to "hundreds of millions" of dollars. The figure \$350,000,000 has been mentioned in speculation.

The sources also said the pres-

ent negotiations began a year ago. The lawyers were making the final drive to have all contracts and agreements polished off in time for the Newfoundland legislature to give its sanction at the present session.

The legislature has been operating in low gear, apparently in an effort to stall off prorogation of the Javelin legislation is presented.

Speculation says Mr. Doyle will take over as director of Nalco and Canadian Javelin will become the major stockholder of the company. Nalco was formed by the Newfoundland government to expedite development of minerals and timber on a 24,000-square-mile tract of land in Newfoundland and Labrador.

Premier Smallwood says Nalco private company in which the government is major stockholder is hinted last week in the legislature new leadership. He is the present director.

Javelin was guaranteed a \$16,500,000 bond issue by the Newfoundland government in 1955 for building a 42-mile railway between Wabush Lake and an existing line from Iron Ore Company of Canada holdings at Knob Lake, Labrador, to Tidewater at Sept-les-Que.

SOME AVENGERS BEING SCRAPPED
HALIFAX (CP)—Some of the navy's old Avenger aircraft are being broken up for parts and scrap. The navy said Monday the parts are being used in other Avengers still operating.

The anti-submarine planes served on the aircraft carrier Magnificent, recently returned to the Royal Navy. They are being replaced with Canadian-built Trackers, which will operate from the new carrier Bonaventure.

A navy spokesman said parts for the Avengers are not being made any more. Fuselages of the old planes are being sold for scrap.

Some planes have been placed with navy reserve squadrons and more will be turned over as the Trackers replace them.

He said some Second World War Seafires and Seafuries have been handed to Crown Assets Corporation for disposal. Currently they are stored at the Shearwater naval air station here.
