**Local and Other Items.**

**LEFT PORT.**—The Yacht Hope Leslie, left port this morning about half past-six o'clock.

**EXCURSION.**—The steam launch Flash left with an excursion party for McNally's island where a dance was held. The party came home in the small hours this morning.

**WARNING TO BICYCLISTS.**—With all the deference to other authorities the usual rule followed by riders here is to pass to the left—exactly as the driving carriages. Trying to introduce passing on the right will, we are afraid, result in many accidents as not one in a hundred do it in Charlottetown.

**PROVISIONS.**—The Montreal Gazette reports "the demand for hams and bacon continues good on export account, and an active trade is doing at firm prices. Lard is neglected. We quote: Canadian pork, \$16 to \$16.50 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pails, at 8½ to 8¾; and compound refined, at 5½c per lb; hams, 10½c to 11½c, and bacon, at 11½c to 12c per lb.

**DAIRY PRODUCTS.**—Cheese is on the rise in Montreal. The Gazette, of Friday, reports business locally was fairly active and dealing in good sized lots of finest Ontario colored was put through at 8½c, while it is reported that transactions were put through over the cable at the equivalent of 8½c. The bulk of the demand however, seemed to run to bargains in eastern makes; that is, goods that showed fair quality and were obtainable at 7.5-8c to 7.3-4c, but with the advanced bids these were not easily obtainable.

**HARVEST EXCURSIONS.**—Second class round trip tickets on sale on Tuesday, August 30th, and September 13th, only, at following rates, viz., to Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie, Brandon, Deloraine, Reston, Estevan, Binscarth, Moosomin, and Winnipegosis, \$28 each; Regina, Moosejaw and Yorkton, \$30 each; Prince Albert and Calgary, \$35 each; Red Deer and Edmonton, \$40 each. Tickets will be good for continuous passage starting on day of sale, and via the all rail line of C. P. R., St. John, N. B., via Port Arthur to destination, returning same route, and will be good for return passage within 60 days from date sold.

All meetings will begin at 7 o'clock p.m. Prominent Conservative speakers will be present at those meetings at which Mr. Campbell cannot attend. The Liberal candidate and other Liberals are invited to attend.

**IN SIBERIAN EXILE.**

**Four English and Two American Miners Imprisoned.**

VANCOUVER, B. C., August 20.—F. W. Beasley, of Montana, and Louis Spitchit, of San Francisco, report that four Englishmen and two Americans were arrested in 1896 and sentenced to Siberian servitude for violating the Russian law, prohibiting exploration of Russian territory in search of precious minerals. They could not obtain the names of the men nor the particulars of their trial. Beasley and Spitchit have just returned from a prospecting tour of Siberia and Alaska. While journeying through Siberia they were stopped by a Russian Commissioner, who ordered them to leave the country immediately. The sudden interruption happened to them when they were within a day and a half of a Siberian convict settlement. Unless they left the country at once the commissioner threatened to send them to prison. He then explained the Russian law, and told of the six men who are now in Siberian servitude. But he suddenly stopped when he saw the interest displayed by Beasley and Spitchit. He seemed to fear that he had made a grave mistake by mentioning the case and refused absolutely to answer their questions. He ordered them to go, and they lost no time in making their departure. They had been in Siberia for fourteen months, and had gone inland more than 200 miles. They crossed to Alaska last March.
