Owing to a heavy gale from the south, the "Carroll" was unable to clear from the wharf until 12 o'clock on Saturday night. Her cargo was composed of 1073 tubs butter, 230 cases eggs, 889 bags and 607 barrels potatoes, 20 barrels mackerel, 67 cases canned meat, 4 barrels fresh meat, 380 hides, 5 barrels calf-skins, 26 barrels hake sounds, 70 drums and casks dry fish, and 171 empty kerosene cans—valued at upwards of \$14,000.

THE Saint Andrew's Dinner at the "Revere" this evening, under the auspices of the Caledonian Club, promises to very enjoyable. A most singular accident occurred on board the steamer "Heather Belle" on a recent passage to Mount Stewart. The bottle broke at the neck, and the neck passed such a distance into his throat, that it was with great difficulty extracted. We learn that he was very ill when removed from the boat, and is yet confined to bed.
