NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market sank sharply to its fourth straight daily loss Monday after a moderate early gain.

The market advanced from the opening and was nicely ahead when news came that President Kennedy had told the United States Chamber of Commerce that he wants an economy kept stable by competition so the government will not have to intervene in the price-setting process.

Some Wall Streeters cited this as a favorable influence, and the Associated Press agencies reported that prices were clobbered last week and looked "cheap" to some buyers.

The most outstanding casualty was International Business Machines which topped 3 1/2 points to 454.

American Telephone was the most active, up 1/4 at 21 1/2. 400 shares. Second was General Motors, up 1/4 at 53 on 60,000 shares.

An estimated \$3,000,000,000 was shown from the quoted value of stocks listed on the New York Exchange, based on the fall in the AP average.

Losers on the Canadian list included Distillers Secagrams, Hudson Bay Mining and Development, and Massey-Ferguson at 12 1/2.

On index, banks were off 0.25 at 60.22 at 135.4. Industrials off 1.2 at 332.4, combined off 0.9 at 271.4, papers up 0.6 at 502.8 and goods up 0.31 at 80.01.
