NEW YORK. (AP) — A joint committee of major league owners and players agreed Tuesday to recommend changes in the players' pension plan which would increase the plan's funds from \$450,000 to about \$2,000,000 a year.

The group also suggested that jurisdiction over these funds be placed in the hands of a committee of two owners and two representatives with "full and complete control."

The pension now is operated by a four-man committee of owners and players and the baseball commissioner, Ford Frick. Final decisions must go before baseball's executive council, consisting entirely of owners.

Under the proposed new plan, the commissioner would have no say in the pension plan and the operation would be in the hands of the owner-player committee, second by their respective groups.

Recommendations must go before the owners and players for ratification.

Red Line Returns To English Hockey LONDON, (CP)—The British Ice Hockey Association has reintroduced the red line to English hockey.

The association, which dropped the red line in the 1951-52 season to encourage stick-handling and "pretty" hockey in general, decided to bring it back on the advice of rink management in the five-team English National Hockey League. Management also suggested that bodychecking be permitted only behind the defending blue line—and not behind the red line as in Canada and elsewhere.

Coaches commented that they expect play to speed up as a result of the change.

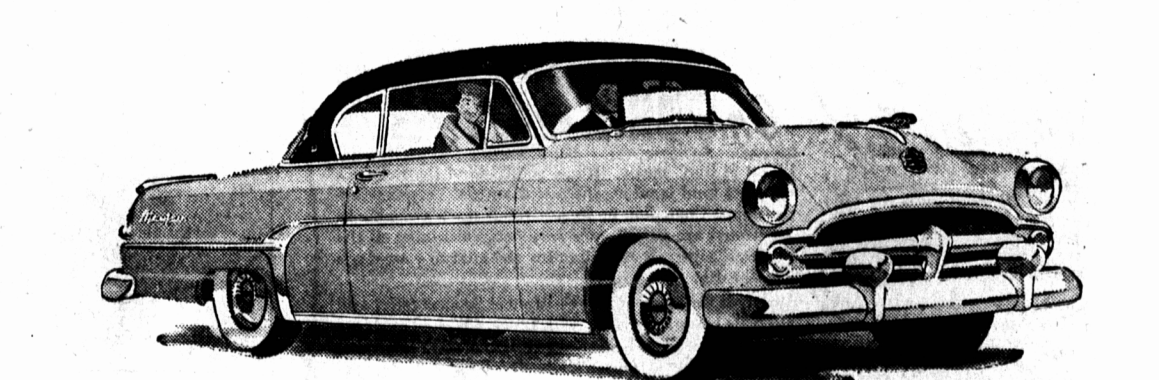
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
