### ARCHBISHOP CLEARY'S MANIFESTO.

Sir,—Like yourself, I think Rev. Father Burke has signally failed in his attempt to side-track the manifesto of Archbishop Cleary; for like the ghost in Hamlet it will not down.

I cannot see how any unprejudiced person can regard it any other light than as a slap at Protestantism, and such being the case I am fully convinced that the course pursued by you must meet with general approval.

My opinion is that Roman Catholics have very much more to fear from contact with one another, than from any influence which may be exerted upon them by attending Protestant funerals, or assisting at Protestant marriages.

If the Archbishop had run over the statistics of crime and rum-selling in the cities of America, on both sides of the line, he might have discovered that amongst the adherents of his own church at large, there are agencies at work tending to degrade humanity to a level which could never be reached from association with Protestants at any of their respectable gatherings. To my mind the Archbishop might as well have finished his manifesto in these words:—"Wherefore come out from among them and be ye separate, and touch not the unclean thing, and ye shall be holy."

In so far as my observation goes, I think that Roman Catholics instead of losing either socially, morally or financially from intermingling with Protestants have been, and perhaps always will be, the gainers by so doing. I have had business relations with many of them from my youth up. I have kept my eyes open, and I can tell Father Burke that such of them as live amongst Protestants in this eastern part of the Island, are not depending upon one cow shivering on the lee side of highway fences. They do not make dirty butter costing fifty cents per pound and then retail it at the stores for 16 cents truck. Nor do they spend their substance in gambling and frolics, as they do in sections well known to the Rev. gentleman, if we may judge from a description which we saw in the papers not very long ago. If there are farmers on this Island who revel among such scenes, certain am I they are not generally found in Protestant communities.

No, sir, let us cultivate the arts of peace and good-will towards our neighbors of whatever creed or nationality, doing unto others as we would have them do unto us, and then there shall be no friction or jarring between us. So mote it be.
