TEMPERANCE.—We understand that the Sons of Temperance in this city are arranging for a public meeting on next Monday evening.

The official figures in the *Canada Gazette* show the total receipts for July and August to be \$5,989,104, and the total expenditure, \$3,182,743.

Walter Gallagher, who shot him, has been arrested on a warrant issued by Wm. Howe, J. P., before whom the preliminary examination of the affair is held. Gallagher had threatened to shoot another boy, it being in the school grounds, and that he accidentally shot Hassock. The prisoner is eighteen years old.

EFFORTS for the establishment of a deaf and dumb school at Fredericton have been completely successful.

A BOY named Crawford fell between two cars on the N. B. Railway, on Friday last, and was instantly killed.

A SEVEN year old daughter of Mr. Alexander Chase, of Drury Cove, N. B., was accidentally drowned on Saturday last.

IN six weeks the Moncton knitting factory will have fifty machines at work, to be increased this fall to one hundred.

THE British Columbians are making ample preparations to welcome and entertain the Governor-General and the Princess.

THERE is said to be a deficit of \$70,000 in the city accounts of London, Ont. This is the result, as reported, of a re-audit.

IT is said that Dan Mace recently trotted a trial heat with the famous mare Lady Thorne in 1.10. The last half was trotted in 1.05.

MESSES. Harry Johnston, Charles Swaby, George LePage and F. Haythorne left to-day for Montreal where they intend to pursue their studies at McGill College.

THE members of the Canadian Associated Press have returned from the trip to Manitoba and the North West. They will give their impressions of the country at an early date.

A NOTORIOUS character named McGuey was shot by the proprietress of a house of ill-fame at Shodiac last week. The bullet entered his throat and the Doctor, at last accounts, was unable to find it.

DANIEL GROVE, of Woodstock, has been fined \$100 for a second violation of the C. T. A., and G. R. Price of the Continental Hotel, St. John, has been fined a like sum for selling liquor on Sunday.

INDIANAPOLIS has acquitted a man who voted three times on election day, on the ground of insanity. Naturally enough any man who'd vote more than once for any candidate to be found in Indianapolis is considered crazy.

TWO Scott Act cases were tried by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. The case of John Trainor was postponed until Thursday, and Mrs. Offer was fined \$50. Several other breaches of the Act have been reported to the prosecutor.

MAJOR LEARD is receiving very free comment on his conduct at the Rifle Association meeting. Mainland papers suggest that his usefulness is gone, and that his intermittent expressions of British bumpishness must now end.

JUDGE TASCHEREAU, of Montreal, on Sept. 7th decided that sales of stock or grain upon margin is really betting, and as money lost in gambling cannot be recovered, dismissed the suit which was to recover the amount of a dishonoured cheque given in payment of a margin.

AT the Halifax Regatta, the Halifax Rowing Association's men carried off \$1,000 between the pair. Hosmer and the West End crew take \$500, including the \$100 forfeit in the Smith match. The Lowell men \$140; the Williams crew \$75, and the Salem men \$25. Warren Smith was the only professional sculler who comes out a loser.

THE overcrowding of the liberal professions is attracting attention in Quebec. The ecclesiastical organ, *La Courrier*, in a persumably inspired article, points out the great demand which will be experienced in the near future for manufactured goods for the North-West, and therefore the corresponding demand for mechanics and skilled labour.

CLARK & RYAN'S Minstrels declined a parting demonstration by their friends on leaving San Francisco for Australia. Four important members were escaping from creditors and two from wives, and it was thought that modest privacy was becoming. The six artists mentioned were secluded in the hold when the steamer was searched for them.

THE Adams Express Company have had the following bonds stolen while in transit. The bonds are unnegotiable:—Nineteen One Thousand Dollar Coupon Bonds of the Leavenworth City and Fort Leavenworth Water Company, of the State of Kansas, bearing date of Feb. 1, 1882, and made payable to the American Loan and Trust Company, Boston, Mass., or bearer. Semi annual coupons attached, including that dated Feb. 1, 1883. Bonds numbered No. 182 to No. 170 inclusive.

A MEETING of the City Council was held last evening. The usual number of accounts disputed and otherwise, were read and ordered to be paid. Three thousand dollars were ordered to be paid the City School Trustees on account. A resolution was passed to the effect that no articles shall hereafter be furnished by storekeepers or others to any servant of the city without a requisition from the City Council. A resolution regarding the Canada Temperance Act fines was also passed. It appears that a petition has been sent to the Government, asking that half the fines collected under the Act be paid to the prosecutor. To this the Council objects, and hence they passed a resolution to employ a counsel—L. H. Davies, Esq.—who will see that the full fines collected under the Act are paid into the City Treasury. The meeting then adjourned.

A CASE of assault was tried by the Stipendiary Magistrate, this forenoon. It was between John Jackson, a chimney sweep, and Conductor McGowan. Jackson, it appears, was employed to sweep a chimney near Mr. McGowan's residence, but he unfortunately mistook the proper chimney, and applied the apparatus to Mr. McGowan's. It is easy to imagine the consequence. No one could bear it, and the Conductor was not an exception. Climbing to the roof, where Jackson sat complacently on the chimney, working his brush, he laid heavy hands upon him, and used him as freight not marked "handle with care." Jackson sought redress in the court; but this forenoon, the Magistrate wisely decided that "Thou shalt not sweep a neighbor's chimney, without giving due notice thereof." The case was dismissed.
