U. S. Gov't Has Large Deficit

WASHINGTON, July 4—(AP)—The United States Government finished fiscal 1950 June 30 with a deficit of \$3,122,102,357 the Treasury reported today. That was about \$2,300,000,000—or 40 per cent—less red ink than anticipated in an administration estimate made only last April 20.

The Government went in the hole for the year—for the 18th time in the last 20 years—by spending \$40,166,835,914 while taking in only \$37,044,733,567.

The federal debt stood at \$257,376,855,385 at the year's end last Friday. The Treasury had \$5,517,087,691 in cash on hand at the time.

Despite the bright showing against administration estimates, the deficit was about \$1,311,000,000 greater than that recorded for the previous year.

Treasury Secretary John Snyder said the main reason was a \$1,201,000,000 decline in revenues in 1950 compared with 1949. That reflected the "recession" in the early part of fiscal 1950, which began July 1, 1949.

Compared with the official budget estimates last January, however, spending during the year just closed was down sharply—\$40,167,000,000 in round numbers against an estimate of \$43,297,000,000.

A big cause for the smaller-than-expected spending was national defence, where outlays lagged more than \$1,000,000,000 below the January estimate.

Chiang Urges U.N. Condemn Russia

TAIPEI, Formosa, July 4—(AP)—Chinese Nationalist leader Chiang Kai-Shek stated the United Nations should charge Russia with instigating the Korean war and ask her to halt further North Korea attacks on the Southern Republic.

Addressing a meeting of his government's officials, Chiang appealed to the United Nations to consolidate Asiatic peoples in their struggle against Communism and prevent them from being utilized by the Russians as tools of aggression.

He spoke shortly after other Nationalist sources said they were disappointed in Washington's rejection of Nationalists' offers to send combat troops to aid in the fight to halt Communist North Korea's invasion of the South Korean Republic.

Three Children Lose Lives in Fire

QUEBEC, July 4 — (CP) — Three children died in a fire that gutted the home of their parents in St. Bruno, Que. it was learned.

Dead are Angele Tremblay, 5, Suzanne, 4, and Laval, 11 months, all children of Jean-Marie Tremblay, a farmer in the remote village, 120 miles north of here in the Lake St. John district.

The two girls, Angele and Suzanne, were burned to death when their father was unable to carry them to safety. Laval was saved from the burning wooden structure, but died a few hours later in hospital.
