It is pleasant to think that the double Sweet Rocket and the fragrant Honeysuckle have remained essentially the same in the days when they were smuggled across the English Channel. Parkinson, writing in 1629, tells of the Double Daffodil that may have been brought to England by the Huguenots, as it seems to have arrived about that time. A Huguenot gardener by the name of Nicholas Cottaer had charge of the Royal Gardens in the reign of William and Mary. After living many years in England he longed to grow some of the flowers he had known in his youth in the south of France. He returned in search of them, was recognized by an old enemy, denounced, and thrown into the Bastille, where he died seven years later. The Sweet William, with its chime-like flower heads of velvety crimson and white was a great novelty in those days and still delights all who grow this bright and long-lasting flower. Not a flower. YOUTHFUL BISHOP

Saint Remigius, who died in 533 A.D., was elected Archbishop of Rheims in France at the age of 19. HERMAN G. BRYAN On January 7th, Mr. Herman George Bryan, a highly respected resident of Freehold passed away in his seventieth year. Mr. Bryan had been in ailing health since he suffered a cerebral hemorrhage a year and a half ago. During his illness he was tenderly cared for by his daughter, Evangeline, Mrs. Robert H. Palmer at her home in Freehold. Mr. Bryan, a son of Arthur and Amelia Bryan, was born at Foxley River. As a young man he went to the United States where he became an American citizen. In 1910 he married Elizabeth Ann Palmer, and for a number of years lived in Atlantic, Mass., where he established a laundry business. In 1920 he purchased a farm known as the George P. Palmer property in Freehold where he established a fox ranch. Prior to his wife's death in 1930 he and his wife spent their summers in Freehold, returning in the winter to the United States. For the next five years Mr. Bryan and his family made their home in Freehold. In 1932 his son William, died in his twentieth year. During World War II, his younger son, Herman Arthur, joined the U.S. Coastguards, and in 1942 lost his life when his ship was sunk in an engagement in the North Atlantic. Some time later Mr. Bryan terminated his business in Freehold and returned to the United States. Of late years he lived in Boston and spent his summers at his old home in Freehold. His passing is mourned by his daughter and only surviving child, Mrs. Robert Palmer of Freehold. He is also survived by one brother, The Reverend Dr. John T. Ingram Bryan of England and two sisters, Rose, Mrs. Rad Henderson and Hattie, Mrs. J. Dacey, both of Dorchester, Mass. One sister, Elizabeth, Mrs. George MacPhee, and four brothers, William, Edward, Henry and Ernest predeceased him. His funeral was held on January tenth, from the home of his daughter to St. Peter's Church, Lot 11, of which he was a devoted member. The service was conducted by his Rector, Rev. L. A. Dignan. The pallbearers were James Palmer, Harold Phillips, William Hardy, Wendell MacKay and Edgar Oatway.
