Three Unique Displays Scheduled For Centre

Moneriff Williamson, director of Confederation Art Gallery and Museum, has announced three unusual collections will be on display during the summer. They include the public premiere of a unique coin, banknote and barter display and two painting exhibits.

Two of the exhibits, 71 paintings from the Poole Collection of Edmonton, Alta., and the first public showing of the coins, notes and barter brought together by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce now a rare open. The remaining collection, 57 paintings, the largest so far assembled in this group, is the CIL Collection from its Montreal headquarters.

The exhibitions will be part of the Charlottetown Festival '65 which opens July 1, and continues until Aug. 31st. In Confederation Centre Theatre, four productions: Spring Thaw, Laugh With Leacock, Anne of Green Gables, Wayne and Shuster in Charlottetown and eight Sunday Concerts and a re-appearance of Les Feux Follets, will be presented. Guided tours of the historic Memorial Building will be provided during the summer.

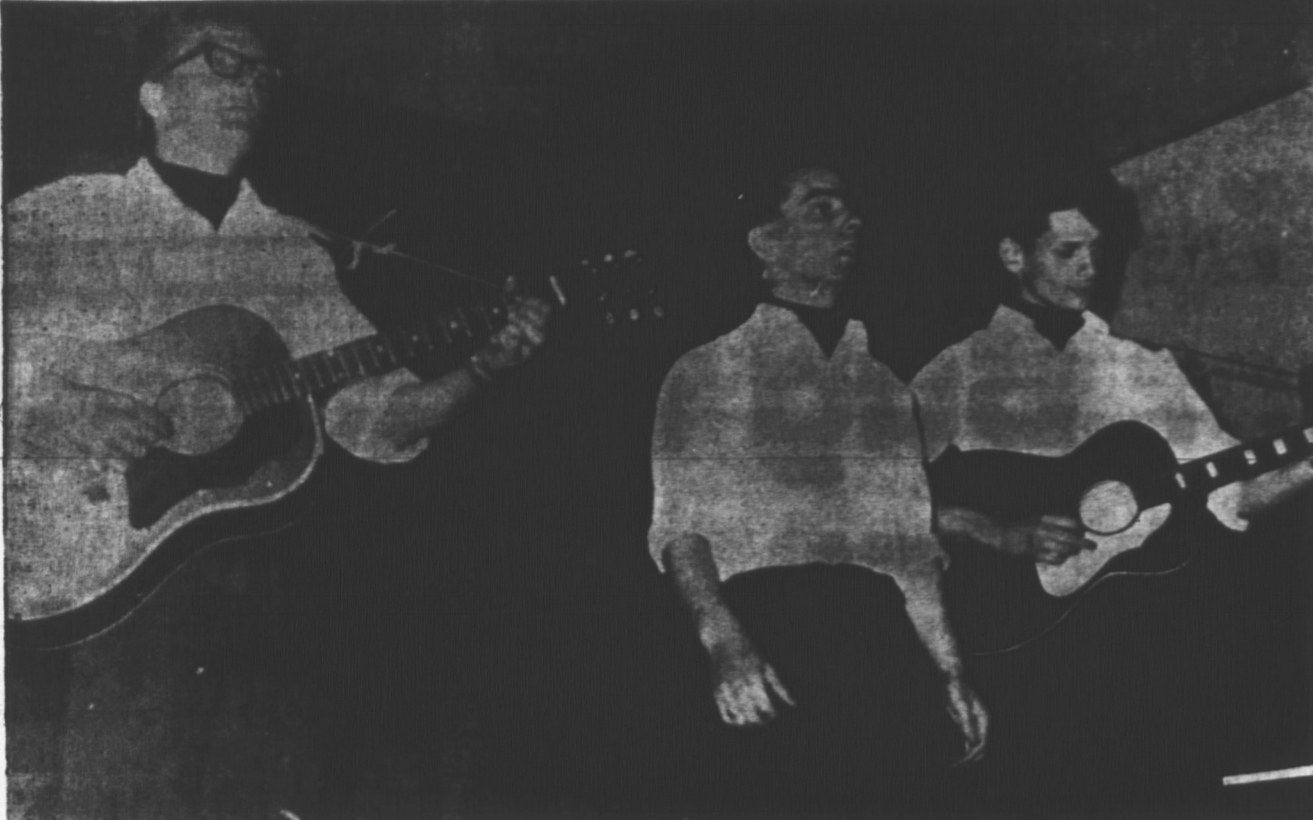

first note issued by the Bank of Canada. Items of barter and shell-money also are on display.

C. E. Carpenter, assistant secretary of the bank, said many of the items are the only known ones of their kind and have always been in the hands of the bank and never sold on the open market. Hence it is difficult to place an estimate on the value of the collection.

The Poole Collection ranging from Kriehoff to Riopelle has been specially assembled from the Poole Foundation in Edmonton. This will be the first major display ever held in P.E.I. of original paintings by members of the Group of Seven.
