

# Atlantics Build Up Early Lead To Defeat Ch'town Islanders 5-3

HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics built up a four-goal lead in the first two periods to defeat Charlottetown Islanders 5-3 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game Saturday night.

The win left Atlantics and Sydney Millionaires tied for first place in the league standing.

Jackie Hollett was the big gun for Halifax, scoring two goals in the second period. Pete Wywrot opened the scoring with the first period's lone goal. Joe Lepine and Dugger McNeil scored the other Halifax goals.

All three Charlottetown goals came in the third period. Elwood Ritchie, Paul Sandin and Bob Gray did the scoring. Buck Whitlock assisting on two of them.

Halifax held a decided edge in the first two periods and threatened to turn the game into a rout with three goals early in the second. Charlottetown rallied in the third.

Goalie Roy McMeekin was outstanding, especially in the third, when Charlottetown outshot Halifax 14-5. McMeekin made 30 stops altogether. Roger Bessette 24.

DETROIT, (AP)—Gordie Howe and Red Kelly each scored their sixth goal of the season Sunday night, leading Detroit Red Wings to a 4-1 victory over New York Rangers and a sweep of their home-and-home week-end series.

The Wings who edged the Rangers 3-2 Saturday night in New York with three third-period goals, clinched Sunday night's game with three tallies in the first period.

Johnny Wilson, Howe and rookie Bill Dineen scored within the first 15 minutes of play.

This early burst sent the Wings to their sixth straight game without a defeat and moved them into a tie with Toronto Maple Leafs for second place in the National Hockey League race.

Paul Ronny clicked on a 12-footer in the second period for the Rangers' only tally. Kelly offset this tally with a point-blank drive in the final period.

## Leafs Come From Behind For 1-1 Tie With Bruins

BOSTON, (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs extended their unbeaten National Hockey League streak to eight games Sunday night by coming from behind for a 1-1 tie with Boston Bruins.

Veteran Porky Dumart scored his first goal of the season for the Bruins early in the third period. Eight minutes later, Ron Stewart evened the count.

Going on 37 and the league's oldest active player, Dumart took a pass from Joe Klukav near the left sideboards and lashed a 35-foot shot through an opening goal. Harry Lumley left in the Toronto cage.

About eight minutes later, after a series of five - man Toronto rushes, Stewart scored on a 12-foot shot, after being set up by captain Ted Kennedy, to deadlock the game.

Although the Bruins lost two players with broken legs—defenceman Bill Quackenbush and winger Real Chevrelis—in Toronto Saturday night, they swung into bruising action at the opening faceoff.

But referee Jack Mehenbacher ruled with a firm hand.

He imposed nine penalties in the opening session, three against Toronto's Eric Nesterenko and two on Boston's Leo Labine.
