Tenders for Steamship Lines.

TENDERS will be received at the Finance Department, Ottawa, up to and including the 1st day of May next, from persons or companies, for the performance of the following steamship services, viz:—
1st. A line of mail steamers sailing from Halifax to Havana, thence to Kingston, thence to Santiago de Cuba, thence to Canada; and (2nd) a line of mail steamers between Canada and Porto Rico and adjacent islands. Trips to be made by each line fortnightly. Steamers to be of a size sufficient to carry 2,000 tons of cargo and to be able to steam twelve knots an hour, averaging not less than eleven knots an hour. The O'Brien Tour.

Mr. Wm. O'Brien, M. P., has cabled to the Montreal branch of the Land League that he would sail from Queenstown for Montreal on Sunday with Kilbride, the evicted tenant. He will lecture in Montreal, Quebec, Ottawa and Toronto.

At a meeting of the Toronto branch of the Irish National League a committee was appointed to make preparations for O'Brien's reception in that city. It was also stated that some sympathizers of the cause had handed \$100 to the treasurer, to be forwarded to ex-Constable Dorry, who threw down his arms and refused to participate in the arrest of Father Ryan.

Archbishop Lynch has cabled to Ireland to a prominent member of the national party, asking him to use his influence to prevent O'Brien, editor of *United Ireland*, coming to Canada to lecture on the Land-downe evictions. His grace says that feeling the evil his coming is likely to cause, he will spare no trouble to prevent it, and if those gentlemen who invited him had deeply considered Catholic interests they would not have done so. Until lately he could not imagine there was any seriousness about the proposal.

It is now said that the Myers-George races are dishonored.

The Sumichrast-Hind case is to come up for trial in Halifax on the 20th May.

Truro, N. S., contributes nearly \$100 a month to the Louisiana State Lottery.

Mr. Tache, who was taken suddenly ill in the Ottawa Senate last week, is dead.

A BILL for the establishment of manhood suffrage is to be introduced into the Manitoba legislature.

The Dominion Alliance has decided to introduce a prohibition bill into parliament this session.

Mr. Hudspeth's correct majority in South Victoria is 51.

MR. R. THORBURN, premier of Newfoundland, has been created a Knight of St. George and St. Michael.

King Mwangi of Uganda, Africa, is a youth of eighteen years only. He has a thousand wives.

The Sultan of Morocco has just promulgated a decree prohibiting the importation of American tobacco under any form into his territory.

The post office at New Market, Ont., was burglarized one night recently. About \$2,000 in stamps and from \$50 to \$100 in money was stolen.

A devil fish with seven arms, each from nine to thirteen feet in length, was lately washed ashore on the Oregon coast, having, perhaps died of old age.

The library of the German historian Von Ranke has been purchased for the Syracuse, N. Y. University. It comprises 3,500 volumes and 75,000 pamphlets.

The Dominion Government has decided to take precautions to prevent the threatened introduction of Asiatic cholera into the Dominion the coming summer.

The Duke of Westminster has promised to give during the remainder of his life \$5,000 a year for the building of new churches. He is now 60 years old.

Under a new edict just promulgated in Japan, criminals are not to be executed singly. When there is one he must wait until there is another to keep him company.

The Ontario House of Assembly has passed the Government's resolution to ratify its contracts for the construction of new parliament buildings at Toronto, to cost \$1,000,000.

Wm. A. Clarke, a clerk in the New York Post Office, stole a package containing \$10,000. He hid the money in an old unused closet, and it was discovered by the Detectives before he had time to remove it.

Jay Gould, Russell Sage, and Cyrus W. Field do not use tobacco in any form. The *Boston Post* thinks this may be construed as an argument for or against tobacco, according to the way that you regard the men.

Two small boys, aged ten and three years, were recently shipped by express from San Francisco to Jersey City, Sago, on them were written their father's name and address, attached to the lapels of their jackets.

It is reported that \$30,000 in counterfeit money has recently been put in circulation in the Upper Provinces. The bills consist chiefly of Dominion \$2 notes, Bank of British North America \$5, and Bank of Commerce \$10.

Morris Diamond, a bookkeeper, of New York, has written seven poems, measuring 3,120 words, on a single postal card. It took him nine hours to do it. The writing is legible, particularly with the aid of a magnifying glass.

A circular has been issued containing a proposal to create a degree of B. E.,—"Bachelor of Engineering" at McGill, and to confer the present degree of B. A. Sc., to other branches of applied science. The matter has not yet been before the faculty.

At the exhibition to be held in Liverpool this summer, many of the Canadian trophies at the Colonial Exhibition will be erected, the managers of the fair being so anxious to secure these attractive exhibits that they are defraying the whole cost of carriage and removal.
