Lapalme To Head Social Justice Program

By WILLIAM STEWART. QUEBEC, May 21 (CP) — Quebec Liberals Saturday chose a 43-year-old member of Parliament, Georges-Emile Lapalme, to lead the old political party against the Union Nationale on a new "social justice" program.

Lapalme, a smooth-speaking lawyer from the tobacco-growing district of Joliette, was the unanimous choice of a party convention that met here for two days to study party policy and pick a permanent leader.

The 1,400 delegates acclaimed Lapalme after he delivered a 20-minute nomination speech attack on the Duplessis administration — government of the party, by the party and for the party — and he became leader without balloting.

Others Withdraw. After three other men nominated as leadership candidates withdrew, the new chief said that Liberals must rely on good organization and hard work for success against the Union Nationale in the next Quebec elections, due in 1952.

Place Death Toll In New Jersey Explosion At 27

By Charles Mercer. SOUTH AMBOY, N. J., May 21 (AP) — Demolition experts proceeded cautiously through a mine-stricken area Saturday for traces of 28 men missing from Friday night's shattering explosion which injured hundreds in this waterfront city.

Four bodies already have been recovered, two of them identified. Residents voted to restore order from chaos and made temporary repairs in the wreckage of their homes.

GLACE BAY, N. S., May 21 (CP) — Scrupulous Freeman Jenkins, president of the Maritimes' biggest union—the coal miners—today announced the firing of research director C. B. Wade in a Red purge preceding an officer election which saw Jenkins win an acclamation.

The chief of United Mine Workers (C. C. L.) district 26 said Eob Stewart, discharged mine and former union official who challenged Mr. Jenkins' long rule in next month's contest, "is ineligible for any district office." He declined to elaborate.

Mr. Jenkins said Mr. Wade's dismissal was "part of a show-down . . . for the removal of Communist influence" in the Union which has a membership of 13,000 in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The powerful Caledonia local called a special gathering to discuss the case and decided to give the matter a full airing at a meeting Wednesday.

Island-Born Publisher Of Sydney Paper Passes

HALIFAX, May 21 (CP) — Henry Pope Duchemin, who advanced the cause of Canada as a journalist with a sharp legal mind, as a lawyer with journalistic perception and as an educationist who combined both assets, died in hospital here today after a lengthy illness. He was 81.

The man who campaigned with persuasive pen and tongue in editorial columns and in court for his deep-seated convictions of what was needed for general betterment, lived long enough to see fruits of his most forceful arguments realized—a program launched for bridging the Strait of Canso to his beloved Cape Breton.

Sometimes he crusaded with broadsword, sometimes with rapier, but once having launched an attack he wouldn't be sidetracked. Never one to disguise his forthright Conservative politics — he didn't like the modern "Progressive Conservative" designation—for the tamer and less-controversial role of neutral writer, he also saw his Sydney Post-Record flourish and expand in a turbulent industrial era which had its share of management-labor strife. And his peppy editorial stands never wavered despite the fact that most of his readers worked in the coal pits and in the steel plants and didn't always agree with him.

As a newspaper man he had gained the presidency of his own paper and the Canadian Press, the co-operative news-gathering and distributing association of Canadian daily papers.
