Council Tells All

Our own U.P.E.I. Student Council met for the first time this year last Sunday night.

The meeting was aimed largely at familiarizing new council members elected last spring with the student union's present operations, and at outlining some of the goals, both immediate and long-term, which this year's council hopes to realize.

Although the months of May through August mean a divorce from most aspects of University life for the majority of our students, the student council's present executive members have been working diligently since entering their positions last spring. President Gordon Cobb, Vice-President Academic Carolyn Ryan, Vice-President Operations Karen Blacquiere, and Treasurer John Orr all spent numerous hours both on and off campus adapting to the demands of their positions, and in Sunday's meeting they each presented a report on the progress of their efforts.

Different executive members represented U.P.E.I. at various conferences throughout the maritimes, and as far away as Ottawa, over the summer. As well as being able to voice the concerns of our university at these gatherings, those in attendance were also afforded the opportunity to develop skills which can only improve their ability to guide the student union's direction in the upcoming year.

Communication lines with the P.E.I. government (in particular the Premier's Office and the Department of Education), the Charlottetown business community and numerous P.E.I.-based organizations were maintained or improved and planning was well underway for various on campus events which will be held in the next few months.

Some of the objectives of this and any year's council were discussed, the foremost of which is to represent the student population as required. In order to accomplish this, council members must know what you the, average (or even not so average) student, needs and what you would like to see happening at our university.

Councillors will be making every effort to reach you, to listen to what you have to say.

In addition to the executive members, there are now or soon will be, student representatives from the university Senate and Board of Governors on council, as well as representatives from Business, Arts, Science, and Education. Ideally, these council members will soon be able to establish a very visible profile, making them very approachable by the student body.

The next council meeting is at Sunday, September 15, at 7:30 p.m. in Kelley 210. Anyone interested in his Student Union's activity is more than welcome to attend; after all you did invest a healthy sum of money in your Student Union last week on Registration Day. For those considering running for a position on council in the upcoming fall election, it would obviously prove valuable to expose yourself to the mechanics of council's operations. Many students view the workings of their student council to be shrouded in a cloak of secrecy; however, council exists to serve the entire student population as best it can. Without input from, and communication with, the student body, Council simply could not function properly. The importance of feedback from members of our Student Union (that means you) cannot be over-emphasized, so please drop by the Barn or the next council meeting, or stop any councillor you may recognize strolling across campus, and let he/she know what you think.
