Ferry Traffic Continues To Increase

BORDEN — Traffic carried to and from Prince Edward Island aboard Canadian National ferries continues its upward trend.

The totals have been higher in each month of 1966 than for the same month last year and April was no exception, according to figures released today by J.G. Davis, manager of CN's Maritime area.

Last month, the three ferries which maintain the year-round service between Borden and Cape Tormentine, N.B., carried 15.4 percent more passengers and 17.5 percent more vehicles than in April, 1965.

The percentage increases represent 5,563 more passengers and 2,665 more vehicles. They bring the traffic totals for April, 1966 to 41,591 passengers and 17,867 vehicles.

The Abegweit, Prince Edward Island and Confederation crossed the Northumberland Strait 643 times last month with passengers. They handled 14,248 automobiles, 2,144 trucks, 1,205 tractors, trailers, 197 buses, 18 motorcycles and 55 trailers.

Canadian National's charter bus-service, which connects with mainland passenger trains at Truro, carried 2,054 passengers last month — more than 11 times as many passengers as was handled on the service in April, 1965.

The Liberals promise the establishment of a P.E.I. Research and Productivity Council to find new uses for our raw materials and modern production and marketing methods.

Mr. Campbell said that the Liberals industrial Development program will place special emphasis on planned development, encouragement and assistance to new and existing industries by and for Islanders.

Mr. Campbell said a Liberal government would implement a property taxation program with the objective of abolishing the present school tax.

He said the Liberals will have a tourist development program designed to diversify tourist traffic to Kings and Prince counties and the program would include negotiations with Ottawa for the establishment of national parks in both those counties.

Mr. Campbell claimed that the program he has outlined was not election bait, but a plan for real action. "These are things we know can be done and which we, as a government, will do," he said.
