

Yanks Defeat White Sox; Dodgers Beat Braves

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees beat Chicago White Sox 7-1 Thursday opening up a six-game lead in the American League with only 13 to play. Mickey Mantle's return to action with a double and a triple gave the Yanks their big boost.

As matters now stand, any combination of nine Yankee victories and Chicago defeats would clinch the pennant for the Yanks.

Mantle, out of the starting lineup since Sept. 3 because of shin splints, drove in one Yankee run with a first-inning double and scored another after he tripled in the third.

Losie Billy Pierce was batted out in the third inning after allowing four runs and seven hits in 2 1/3 innings.

Sherm Lollar's home run in the second accounted for the only Chicago run.

CHICAGO (AP)—Righthander Bob Friend and southpaw R. G. Smith hurled Pittsburgh Pirates to 4-1 and 2-1 victories Friday, ploughing Chicago Cubs deeper

into the National League cellar. Gene Fresse's run-scoring single in the ninth inning of the second game broke up a pitchers' duel between Smith and young Doc Drabowsky.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Roy Sievers crashed his 37th and 38th home runs Friday night as Washington defeated Kansas City, 11-6, and ended a five-game losing streak. Gus Zernial smashed his 21st homer for the Athletics.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Carl Furillo bounced a two-run double to left and Milwaukee's pitchers walked in two runs Friday night as Brooklyn Dodgers shoved over four runs in the seventh and defeated the National League's first place Braves, 5-1.

It was the sixth defeat in their last nine games for the Braves who were stopped on five hits by righthander Don Drysdale who leads the Brooklyn mound staff with 15 victories. He has nine losses.

Drysdale pitched one-hit ball in the last five innings as he bested

Milwaukee's righthander Gene Conley in what started out as a mound duel. It was the first complete game for Drysdale against the Braves this season.

BOSTON (AP)—Cleveland Indians clobbered four Boston pitchers for 21 hits and a 16-3 victory over Boston Red Sox Friday night as veteran Mike Garcia ended a hex which had cost half his losses this season.

Veteran first baseman Vic Wertz drove in five runs with his 24th homer and a pair of sacrifice flies, while Dick Williams had five hits and Bobby Avila four in the Cleveland assault.

Garcia, who had dropped four games in Boston this year and had a 1-5 mark against the Sox in 1956, settled down after a shaky start to hurl a strong six-hitter.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—New York Giants handed St. Louis pennant hope a severe blow Friday night by beating the Cardinals 7-3 on the hitting of William Mays and Ray Jablonski and superb relief pitching by rookie Jim Constable and veteran Marv Grissom.

HUNTER'S CORNER

The Trout Were Particular, Now We Will See Game

One more day and the trout fishermen's reign is ended and the hunter is standing by to take over. All in all the trout fishing this season has not quite been up to par. There appeared to be no scarcity of trout in many of the time honoured fishing spots but they were decidedly temperamental in their acceptance of anglers offerings. If what one had to offer suited, all well and good, but if it didn't a brush off was the order of the day. Here is an incident that occurred on Leard's Pond, Riverton, which tried their luck but with no success for several hours, although a wide assortment of flies and buck-tails, streamers and what have you was offered.

One angler was sporting a pair of blue wool socks and in making a sort of sloppy cast the fly caught in his sock and pulled out several strands of blue yarn. He was unaware of what had happened and was surprised to hook and land a nice trout on his next cast. On removing the fly he found out the attraction and worked this angle for all it was worth. He creeded a nice catch to the amazement of his companion but it was not until they were ready to pull out he

let him in on the secret. What a trout will fall for one day is no assurance it will work on the next.

WELL FED

Speaking for myself I never caught less trout than I have taken to date but time is running out fast. Never in my experience have I known trout to be so choosy or so fat and rounded out when creeded. The bulk of the trout I caught took the offering under water and only the odd one came after it with their usual breathtaking lunge that carried them clear out of the water and set the wavelets lapping against the side of the boat. At what caused the changed tactics in trout this season one can only guess. This past ten days action has been a bit livelier in some sections but the waking up was so late to help the angler to any great degree.

Wavering skeins of ducks against the evening dusk indicate that the July hatch is beginning to try out their wings although quite a few other broods are just on the verge. Maybe the ducks that cannot fly at all on opening morning will be the best off if they choose to be low and keep under cover in the

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DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

A Maine correspondent has very kindly sent us news of Earl Semple's doings there and elsewhere, and the horses in his stable which are: Volo Stone, Wilbur M and Jim McElwain, Jewels Hiram, Smokey Tass, that was the winner of the 2:19 trot stake at Gorham in July, in 2:02.15 and 2:09, and was awarded the trophy by the track management. Now we see where the Stable is racing at Vernon Downs, where Jewels Hiram won the C. Trot in 2:05.25, and Jim McElwain won the B. Trot in 2:06. Both these horses are owned by R.F. Steele, Bangor, Maine. No doubt, others in the stable have the winning habit also.

At Vernon Downs on August 26, the 2:23 trot was won by the three-year-old filly, Betty Joe, by Victory Song, dam Cassie Hanover, a mare that was formerly owned in New Glasgow, N.S. The winning owner is Mrs. Joe O'Brien, and we are sure she was the most delighted person on the grounds. A section of the S.A. Camp stable racing there, among them being Opolee Song, a two-year-old filly that won the 2:28 - 30 trot in 2:06.45, and the two-year-old filly, Sandra Red, that won the C. Pace in 2:05.35. There was a new driver up behind them—Cedeberg, which means that two other divisions of the Camp Stable are racing elsewhere.

Vernon Downs, they issue a statement of the standing of the drivers from time to time, and we notice where driver Maltucci still leads there in the universal drivers rating system with an average of .362, and at Saratoga Raceway standings released on September 3, showed Angus Allen, formerly of Halifax, in second place.

Our very good friend, J. Vernon Oatway, has remembered us by sending a screenshot of last Saturday night's racing at Richelieu track, Montreal, where the third dash and final leg of the \$13,600 Stake Pace, which had as starters six of the fastest pacers racing on half - mile tracks was raced. It will be remembered that the first leg was won by Diamond Hal, driven by Joe O'Brien, in 2:01.45, Duane Hanover was second. The second leg was won by Duane Hanover, driven by Billy Houghton, in the same time, 2:01.45, with Diamond Hal second and Bay State Pat third. The final leg was won by Diamond Hal (J. O'Brien), Dottie's Pick, 1:59.25, driven by J. Arthur was second, time 2:01.

BY AIR

The track record, \$100.25, is held by Diamond Hal (J. O'Brien), which is also a Canadian racing record. The trotting record at Richelieu is held by Scott Frost, driven by Joe O'Brien, time 2:01.35, which is also the Canadian trotting record. Perhaps some of our readers would be speculating as to the way Diamond Hal and Duane Hanover would be conveyed to Montreal. It would be by plane, and that is the way all the top horses manage to race at so many distant tracks where they compete in stakes that run up to enormous sums.
