A hope that auditoriums of the province's new regional high schools may develop into cultural and social centers for the communities around them was expressed Saturday night by Premier Walter R. Shaw. He spoke briefly at the dinner, held at the Charlottetown Hotel, which marked the close of the two-day provincial Alcohol Education Conference.

## Opening Ceremonies Held For Crest Lanes

SUMMERSIDE — With the cutting of a ribbon by Mayor J. Ernest Morrison, Crest Lanes' 16-lane bowling centre was officially opened on Saturday afternoon before a capacity crowd estimated at about 1,000 people.

Manager of the ultra-modern establishment, James Hogan, stated that the opening was a tremendous success, far above what was anticipated, with a total of about 5,000 visiting the alleys on Saturday.

An idea of the numbers in attendance can be obtained from the amount of food and drinks consumed. This includes 2,500 drinks of soda pop, 900 coffees, 800 hot dogs and 600 cones of ice cream.

Mr. Hogan initiated the ceremony by thanking the general contractors, Williams and Murphy, for the fine job, and also extended thanks to the sub-contractors.

He then introduced the staff at the bowling centre, which will total nine, before calling upon the various speakers.

Keith Pickard, the architect and president of Crest Lanes, also complimented the contractors for their fine work in adverse winter and mud conditions and thanked the large crowd for its attendance. He announced that the plans were laid out so that in the future the centre could be enlarged by as much as 32 lanes if a need for them arose.

## Fleming's Bo Sparks Ottawa

By JAMES NELSON OTTAWA (CP) — Donald Fleming, Canada's doughy finance minister for the last 4½ years, lately has been showing unusual signs of wit, good humor and bouncing enthusiasm.

Whether this means a "sunshine" budget for Canadian taxpayers, only time will tell. Normally, this is the period for bringing down the federal budget.

Mr. Fleming, 57 this month, has always displayed a seriousness, command of his job, and application to work. This has tended to give him the outward appearance of a sobered individual who rarely smiles.

He was always quick to get into the thick of a political fight, his voice rising with the intensity of his attack.

Now, along with his good humor and ready wit, he has been adopting a moderate approach in his dealings with the opposition in the Commons.

And he has become the goodwill ambassador of the federal government in its renewed negotiations with Premier W. A. C. Bennett of British Columbia over the troublesome Columbia River power impasse.
