monds was the heart king. When the dummy was spread, South saw that heroic measures would be needed to bring home the contract. He couldn't even hope to ruff two spades in dummy — this would inevitably leave him with a trump loser, since only one high trump would remain in dummy. After long thought, South saw the only chance and promptly went out for it. He ducked the opening lead in dummy and ruffed in his own hand, then cashed the ace and king of diamonds. Leaving the trump ten at large, he ruffed a second heart, returned to the spade king and ruffed a third heart, returned to the spade ace and ruffed a fourth heart, then led a low club to the ace. Now he drew West's diamond ten, and when the heart ace followed, East was squeezed. If he gave up his last spade, declarer, discarding after him, would keep the spade seven and cash it when he got in with the club king; and if East's actual discard of another club, South threw away the spade seven and cashed in the king and four of clubs.

Remembrance Day Services In King's Co.

Remembrance Day services were held in several centres in King's County yesterday. In all cases large numbers attended to pay homage to war dead.

At Georgetown

Remembrance Day was fittingly observed at Georgetown under the leaden skies as citizens of the town joined with veterans of two world wars in memorial services at the monument and in the Town Hall. The parade, under the direction of Marshal J. B. Scully, formed up at the Town Hall, and moved to the monument in the following order: standard bearer, Michael Burke, Jr., headed the veterans of two world wars, followed by members of the Ladies Auxiliary, Reserve Army, Boy Scouts and Cubs, Home and School Association, Government and Town representatives, school children, and citizens.

The program at the monument opened with "O Canada", followed by two minutes silence. Last Post, recitation of stanza of poem by Laurence Binyan, Revillie, prayer, laying of wreaths in the following order: Provincial Government wreath laid by Brenton St. John, Souris, minister without portfolio; Town of Georgetown by Councillor Raymond Solomon; Canadian Legion by president Rev. W. A. Paterson; Ladies Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion by president Mrs. J. W. Lavers; Home and School Association, by president J. H. MacDonald; Women's Association of St. Davids United Church by Mrs. Victor Rafuse; Holy Name Society of St. James Roman Catholic Church by Frank Lavandier; the next of kin of departed veterans and general public.

Boy Scouts and Reserve Army personnel stood with bowed heads at each of the four corners of the monument during the entire ceremony. The parade returned to the Town Hall where under the chairmanship of Legion president, W. A. Paterson, the following program was carried out: Hymn "O God Our Help In Ages Past".

Major Jack Wright, Summerside former commander of D Company, P. E. I. Highlanders, and also the North Nova Scotia Highlanders was the guest speaker for the day. He was followed by J. Brenton St. John for the Provincial Government; Councillor Raymond Solomon, acting on behalf of Mayor P. L. Boudreau, who was prevented from attending due to illness; Mr. Stanley Streight, Rev. O. Kiggins, Mr. T. J. Kichham, M. P.

The program at the hall was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem. A supper was held in the Town Hall in the evening for veterans and their wives. In the afternoon veterans of Georgetown motored to Launching where they joined with the veterans and citizens of that area in Remembrance Day services at the monument.

At Montague

In a simple but impressive ceremony held at the Kings County Memorial Hospital yesterday, the veterans of two world wars, and the citizens of Montague and surrounding districts in large number paid a solemn respect and tribute to fallen comrades and loyal ones who had paid the supreme sacrifice. The parade formed at the Legion Hall at 10:30, and led by Comrade Cyril Johnston and Piper Donald MacLeod, it proceeded along Main Street to the hospital. Included in the parade was the color party, members of the R. C. M. P. detachment in official scarlet tunics and dress, the Reserve Army, the veterans of two world wars, and the Scouts and Cubs.

After a short interlude of martial music, and a pipe selection by Piper MacLeod, the Last Post was sounded by Bugler John Denham. Two minutes of respectful silence followed, after which Revellie was sounded by Comrade Denham. A poem "They Shall Grow Not Old" was read by Comrade Johnston. The laying of wreaths followed: Montague Branch Canadian Legion, Comrade Roddy Martin; town of Montague, Comrade and Town Councillor, Marshall Reynolds; wreaths laid by the general public. The lament was played by Piper MacLeod after which Rev. F. N. Young led in prayer in honour of those fallen. The ceremony was concluded with "The Queen" after which the parade returned to the Legion Hall

where a delicious dinner was served the veterans and their families by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Montague Branch Canadian Legion.

At Souris

The Catholic veterans paraded to St. Mary's Church where Mass was celebrated at 9 A.M. by Rt. Rev. J. A. Murphy. After the service the veterans returned to the Legion rooms. The parade to the Memorial Monument moved off at 10:45 under command of Lieut. Fosh MacDonald, headed by members of the Legion, Reserve Army units, Girl Guides and the school children. On arrival at the monument a two-minute silence was observed. Wreaths were then laid by Mr. John D. MacIntyre, president of the Legion, Mayor C. E. LaVie for the Town and the general public. Capt. Francis A. White was the only speaker.

As the parade returned to the Legion rooms the salute was taken by Capt. P. A. MacLellan, accompanied by Mayor C. E. LaVie who were stationed in front of the Post Office building. The Legion held a smoker last evening.
