Plant Shutdown At Souris Is Declared 'Temporary'

Denial of a report published Saturday that the Eastern Packing Co. plant at Souris has closed for the season has been made by Company officials.

"The report was not correct," it was stated by A.E. Gallant, a company director, "and was not based on information given by any spokesman for the company."

He extended "assurance from the company that the closing was only temporary" and that the company intends to "process all fish as they become available."

A temporary halt became necessary, it was explained, when bad weather kept inshore fishermen from fishing for over two weeks and "the canning plant was forced to close until a supply of fish was available."

Meanwhile a number of employees of the Eastpack plant

who were affected by the lay-off a week ago told The Guardian it was their understanding that the shutdown was for the balance of the season.

A number of them already filed unemployment insurance claims, The Guardian has been told.

It was through these circumstances that the report became current that the plant was closed for the season.

In denying this view, the company stated: "It has always been the practice of the company to provide as much employment as possible in the community. The company intends to continue this practice and all available fish will be processed at the cannery. It is also hoped that, as in previous years, beef and chicken will be canned later in the season."

The company was particularly emphatic in denying that it planned to ship fresh mackerel when available direct by truck to American and Canadian markets.

Commission To Make Survey Of Water, Sewage Problems

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE PATRIOT

Present plans to cope with the water contamination problem affecting homes in the Glover Shore area just outside Summerside east call for the town planning commission to survey the district and make recommendations as to what measures are necessary, stated Dr. Hubert MacNeill, provincial minister of health.

Dr. MacNeill said it might be necessary to install a common water supply unit as well as a common disposal system, as the Glover's Shore area is too crowded for individual wells and sewage systems.

He stated a large septic tank might be the answer to the disposal problem adding that a secondary means would be piping out into the channel. However, he added this would contaminate the shore water and would not be as suitable as the first mentioned type for ridding the area of sewerage.

The financing would have to be done by the residents who are located in the Wilmot school district with government grants obtainable for this work.

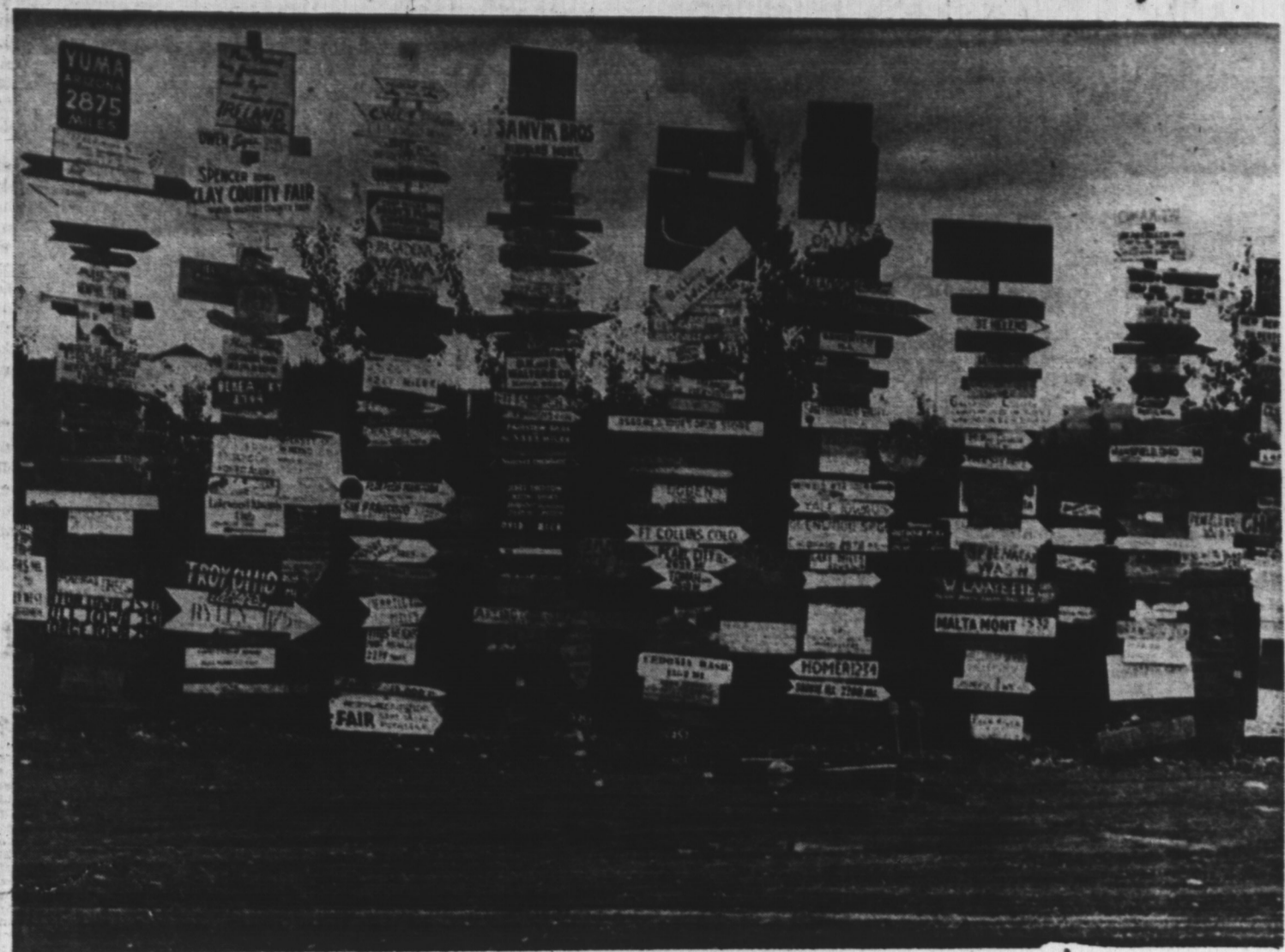
Hymns were: "The Lord's My Shepherd" and "We Cannot Think of Them as Dead".

The alleged attempt to attack the child was made at a vacant lot along the way, where the child says she was compelled to remove articles of clothing.

Later a Prince County man was arrested by Police Constables Harry MacKay and Elmer Matheson, and held in jail on a drunk charge, after reportedly being identified by the child.

It is expected the man will appear in police court this morning.

Teacher Supply Shows Increase

A sharp drop in the number of permits issued to teachers this year, combined with a jump in enrollment in the teacher training course has created a far brighter picture in education in this province.

Malcolm A. MacKenzie, deputy minister and director of education, said yesterday the enrollment in teacher training at Prince of Wales College this term was more than double that of last year. This term there are 76 pupils taking the course where there were only 35 in 1958. A 15-year peak was reached in 1950-51 when there were 91.

The teacher training enrollment at St. Dunstan's University also shows a sharp rise over last year when the course was instituted for the first time. This year there are 37 enrolled compared to the 23 entered in 1958.

At the same time the number of permits the department has issued to date dropped to 65 from last year's 105. The higher total has remained steady for the past five years at between 105 and 110 every term.

Radio License For Dartmouth Is Requested At BBG Meeting

OTTAWA (CP) — Applications for licences to operate a new television station at Grand Falls, Nfld., and a 5,000-watts radio station at Dartmouth, N.S., were made to the Board of Broadcast Governors Monday.

A CBC representative also said an application is being completed by the corporation for its own TV station to serve Grand Falls, Botwood and Gander in Newfoundland.

Application for the Dartmouth radio station—to give the community its own outlet—was opposed by station CHNS in Halifax on grounds the Dartmouth area was covered sufficiently by Halifax-based radio stations and a TV outlet.

Other applications to the BBG included one for a licence to operate a 5,700-watts radio station at Sherbrooke, Que., and one to operate a 1,000-watts radio station at Joliette, Que.

The Newfoundland Broadcasting Co. Ltd., made the application for a Grand Falls TV station. Robert Keddy, CBC representative, said the corporation now is working on an application for a station of its own to serve Grand Falls, Botwood and Gander. The Corporation was planning the stations on a "priority basis."

He said he expects the CBC will file the application with the transport department by the end of October.

Mr. Keddy said the CBC board of directors instructed him to ask the BBG for a deferment of the application until the corporation's bid is before it.

RELAY OUTLET Mr. Keddy said the CBC's Grand Falls station would cost about \$150,000. Initially the station would be a sort of "relay outlet."

Mr. Jamieson said a deferment would mean that Grand Falls would not have a station before next summer.

He said he doubts his company's proposed station would cost less than \$150,000.

Mr. Keddy asked for a power increase for CBYT Corner Brook, Nfld., from 63.8 watts video and 38.3 watts audio to 197 watts video and 96.5 watts audio. The power increase would increase the potential coverage from 4,900 to 5,100 homes.

John A. Funston asked for a licence to operate a 5,000-watts radio station at 1250 on the dial at Dartmouth, N.S.

He said the proposed station's

main aim would be to serve the 50,000 residents of Dartmouth. Halifax now is being served by two private stations.

OWN NEEDED It was 15 years since a radio station was licensed in the Halifax-Dartmouth area. Dartmouth now received only "superficial service" from the Halifax stations. This was proper for these stations, but Dartmouth needed its own radio service.

Gerry Redmond, manager of CHNS said the metropolitan area of Halifax now is served by one TV station, three radio stations, including one CBC outlet, two dailies and two weeklies.

Dartmouth was part of the metropolitan area and did not require a separate radio operation of its own.

By next June, Halifax likely would have a second TV outlet, making the area the most heavily serviced market of any of comparable size in Canada.

Finlay MacDonald, manager of CJCH Halifax said the private stations have felt the impact of the CBC's drive for local advertising. He indicated the belief that a radio station at Dartmouth might hurt the development of a second privately-owned TV station in Halifax.

NO OPPOSITION Mr. Keddy said on behalf of the CBC that if broadcasting outlets number more than the market can support service will suffer. The CBC did not oppose the application.

In reply, Mr. Funston said a number of smaller Nova Scotia towns are served by the two big stations in Halifax but still have their own local outlets. There was no reason why Dartmouth, which was not part of Halifax, should not have a station of its own.

Mr. Keddy presented a bid for the CBC for a change of frequency for its low power relay transmitter CBRO Greenwood, B.C., from 730 to 740 on the dial. Station CJCB - TV, Sydney, N.S., asked for a change of site for its satellite station at Inverness, N.S., a mile from the originally proposed site.

The new site was along a road opened the year round and better suited for picking up the main station's signal for rebroadcast.

La Tribune Limitee, Sherbrooke, Que., applied for a licence to operate a 5,700-watts frequency modulation radio station in Sherbrooke.
