

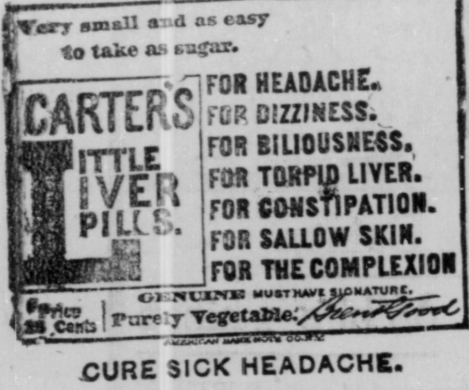

REPATRIATION OF THE JEWS

To return to the Holy Land has for many centuries been the dearest desire of the Jews. Over eighteen hundred years ago the Jews were driven out of Jerusalem and they have ceased to exist as a nation. Since then, the idea of the reoccupation of Palestine has been a dream. But the persecuted children of Israel have been in recent years awakened to very very vigorous efforts for their repatriation. In August of this year the fourth congress of the present Zionist movement was held in London. At this there were over six hundred delegates from all parts of the earth. These included Dr. Theodore Herzl, of Vienna, leader of the movement, Dr. Max Nordau, and Mr. Clarence I. DeSala, President of the Federation of the Canadian Zionist Societies. The present plan for the acquisition of Palestine is to purchase from the Turkish Government that portion of its domain known as the Holy Land. This country shall be governed as Canada is. The Jewish state will have home rule as regards their internal affairs, the Turks to keep a hold upon the land and to retain their supremacy. In order that this home government be made stable and secure the world over, the great powers will be asked to come to an understanding in the matter and jointly agree that the rights of the Jewish nation be observed. Thus the question is largely one of price and terms, and with this in view a fund has been started, known as the Jewish Colonial Trust. The beginning of the movement was three years ago. Today it has two hundred thousand members. As explained by Mr. de Sola, who has returned to Canada, the object of the organization is, first the securing of a home for the oppressed and suffering Jew, no matter from what country he may come, or what language he may speak; secondly, the development of agricultural colonies and industries of all kinds; thirdly, the arousing of Jewish national sentiment by the establishment of a central governing power known as the Zionist Congress; and lastly the restoration of the Hebrew language and Hebrew literature. So the home that Israel was once driven from may again be the dwelling place of this peculiar people.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Would it be well, asks a contemporary, to have another Globe scandal? Do you really think that the men who in 1896 preached honesty in the organ were entitled to \$1,500,000 worth of public property that they never earned, and for which they did not pay one cent? Are you going to permit the organ to take another haul from the taxpayer? Do you think that the public territory belongs to the people, or that it ought to be divided up among grasping politicians as payment for their party services.

—Be it known that the Orthodox church of Russia is the wealthiest in the world. As evidence of this, it is stated "that it could easily pay the national debt of the empire, amounting to about £200,000,000, or nearly \$1,000,000,000, and yet not be impoverished." This seems almost incredible; but it must be remembered that it has some very lucrative sources of revenue. One of the most profitable is the sale of candles. Being "consecrated candles" there is an enormous demand for them during the easter season.

—The Sydney Herald remarks that the marvellous progress of the United States as a manufacturing nation is stupifying Europe, and particularly Great Britain. United States manufactures, including especially iron and steel and their products, are rapidly driving out British goods in Britain's own markets. Having become supreme in the production of agricultural products, the United States is now directing all its energies towards the expansion of its manufacturing industries. Our neighbors are now exporting more than a million dollars worth of manufactured products every day in the year, holidays and Sundays included. The principal market is a free trade country, while the great producer is protected to the hilt.

POLITICAL INDIFFERENCE.

SIR.—The federal elections will soon be upon us and already many candidates are in the field seeking nomination and election to the House of Commons. Just at the beginning of the campaign a very discouraging feature is becoming apparent. It is that many of our most respectable countrymen are declaring themselves absolutely indifferent as to the issue of the coming election, are proclaiming themselves to be disgusted with politics, some having decided within themselves that when the day for voting comes they will not vote. Among the most prominent causes of this feeling are, first, the lack of any great questions to be submitted to the popular vote; second, the increase of bribery and corruption; and third the questionable character of many politicians and political agents in their connivance to this bribery and corruption. The first of these seems at first plausible. We are not now called upon to decide as to whether or not we shall form a confederation, as to whether or not we shall build transcontinental railways; the ship of state has been built and fairly launched, but does not the steering and management of this ship need as much wisdom, earnestness and sincerity and strength as her building and launching, do we not need wise heads and strong arms to direct her course either west or east, north or south; else with tyros, desperadoes or pirates at the helm she will either be a national laughing stock and fall a prey to the winds and waves and rocks that beset her course or she will be a disgrace to her builders and fall a prey to the virtuous indignation of a stronger power; so those who built and launched her will have done their work in vain. Yes! Canada is now fairly started in her career as a nation, and it behooves every one of her citizens to do his part in making her a mighty force in the world for truth and justice. Then as to the increase of bribery and corruption: I say that there is nothing which does more to bring this about than the indifference of respectable people. When the weaker brethren see the indifference of those whom they look up to can we wonder at their argument that it matters little which way they vote, that a five or ten dollar note is more than acceptable to them; that it would be foolishness to refuse it when offered. The questionable character of many politicians and political agents I take to be the direct result of the neglect of those who look down upon them, and with whom the word unscrupulous is an adjective constantly to be associated with the word politician. Someone has to take charge, and if men of respectability and honesty do not beset themselves and see to it that the government of the country is in the hands of men in whose character and principles they have confidence, then it is only natural that office-seekers, boodlers and their associates will see their chance and take it. There was a time when it was considered a great honor, something for which a reliable business man, a good doctor, an honest farmer, might well aspire, to be a member either of the Dominion or Local Parliaments. There was a time when such a man might look with confidence to the best men of the country for hearty support. But now there is no greater discouragement to those of our politicians who have the best interests of their country at heart, who are not in the field for their own selfish interests, I say there is no greater discouragement to them than this lack of interest about which I write.

Again there are others who abstain from taking any interest in politics because they are afraid of giving offence; there are clergymen who abstain from expressing their opinions, even from voting because they do not wish to offend any member of their congregations; there are merchants who do the same because they have among their customers men differing politically I have heard that the managers of some of our banks advise their clerks not to vote or take any active interest in politics, that the business of the bank may not suffer thereby. A clergyman, merchant bank clerk or any other man who neglects his plain duty as a citizen for considerations such as these I take to be not worthy of the name citizen at all.

The elections will soon be on. It is now the time for every lover of his country, whether he be Liberal or Conservative independent or what not, to take his part, however quietly, in nominating, working for and electing good reliable men to govern this Canada of ours for another five years. Let us not shirk the duty, but let us manfully and unflinchingly shoulder the responsibility laid upon us and act under it as good men and good citizens should act.

The Mail and Empire remarks that "it is pleasant indeed to know that Hugh John is not welcome to Israel Tarte. Tarte caricatures him brutally, attacks him viciously and exhibits in other ways his dislike for him. Were Hugh John acceptable to Tarte loyal men might shrink from him. Bourassa and Monet are equally antagonistic to Sir John Macdonald's son."

WEST PRINCE.—The Liberal Convention for the Riding of West Prince was held at O'Leary Thursday afternoon to nominate a candidate for that constituency. Mr. B. D. MacLellan, M. P., Dr. W. W. Wickham, Tignish, and Hon. J. W. Richards, M. L. A., were put in nomination and a ballot taken. On the first ballot Mr. Richards, having the smallest number of votes, retired. On the first second ballot, Mr. MacLellan had a majority, and his nomination was afterwards made unanimous.—Agriculturist.

CANADA GETS \$830,000

For Produce Sent to South Africa on War Office Order.

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—Mr. W. W. Moore, of the Department of Agriculture, sails tomorrow on the steamship Nyassa from St. John for Capetown. The Nyassa is taking 2,500 additional tons of Canadian hay for the Imperial Government, which makes 19,200 tons, valued at over \$300,000, sent from Canada since the outbreak of the war. In addition there has been shipped from Canada to South Africa for the use of the Imperial troops 5,207 bags of oats, 7,547 cases of jams, 12,687 cases of beef, and 38,285 sacks of flour. The total amount thus expended in Canada by the Home Government within a short period for these articles of produce, transportation charges on land and sea, amounts to the splendid total of \$830,000.

When Mr. Moore has transferred the Nyassa's cargo of hay to the Imperial authorities at the Cape he will visit different points in the South African colonies, looking for openings for Canadian food products.
