A COUNTER ATTRACTION.
 It is pleasing to note that a movement has been set on foot to the end that the evil influences of our numerous saloons and clubs may be in some measure counteracted. These influences have lately run riot in Charlottetown. Charlottetown has long been one of the most drunken cities of North America; and all the talk and all the laws that have been passed and put into operation have apparently had no good effect. Many of our young men are being debauched and ruined. Either the licensed or unlicensed saloons, or the club, or a certain class of drugstore claims their attention, and they go on from bad to worse. To provide other attractions is, we believe, the object of the promoters of the new movement.

NO ENFORCEMENT OF LAW.
 ADVICES come from the country that the Scott Act is not being administered at all since Farquharson got his License Act dragged through the Legislature. Whenever there is a spasmodic attempt at enforcement, it is only some poor creature who can't give the party a vote who is jailed. Last week a poor blind man from Tignish was, we are informed, taken to Summerside jail, while a whole dozen vendors are in full blast under the inspector's nose in the village whence he came. Some of them openly aver that the machine will look out for them. They are supporters of the great temperance hypocrisy led by Premier Farquharson: If the people believe that law and justice should be respected they must condemn a Government which will wink at crime committed by its friends. Perhaps the want of an Attorney General is the cause of the present culpable apathy.

WANTED—AN ATTORNEY GENERAL
 "It is the business of the Attorney General's Department in a Provincial Government to see that a law is enforced and crime punished. It should not wait for a spur from the public or a complaint from a victim. Wherever the arm of the law seems too short or too inert to overtake the criminal, the Attorney-General should spring in at once, and find and cure the cause of the weakness." Reading this in the Montreal Star the other day we began to realize the great danger law and order runs in this Province without an Attorney General. Surely it is not necessary to prostitute even the administration of the law to political expediency. We have seen enough of our idols smashed for political purposes since a Liberal regime came into power, without allowing the harpy claws of the machine to sink into the legal system of the Province. Let us have an Attorney General then before we get into deep water. Although the proclamation in the Royal Gazette still publishes Hector C. McDonald for Attorney General everybody knows he is County Court Judge for Queen's County, and is impeded by the statute from serving in a dual capacity. Premier Farquharson may as well face the music first as last.
 —Although Sir Charles Tupper returned to Canada only a few days ago, he already has a good deal of work cut out for him. The veteran statesman is to deliver an address on Cape Breton day at the Halifax exhibition on the 27th, and will be banqueted and address a public meeting at Berwick, on October 3rd. From there he goes to Yarmouth to open the county fair. Because of these engagements Sir Charles has been obliged to postpone the opening of his Ontario campaign, which was fixed for September 28th.

HOTEL ACCOMMODATION.
 With additional steamships and lower fares and better times throughout North America, and with sewerage, electric lights, and all modern conveniences, as well as the certain prospect of additional railway accommodation, we have a situation which demands increased hotel accommodation of the better class. If those who are in the business should put up their money and supply the need that has already been felt it will be well. But if not, there ought to be no complaints if outsiders should come in and set up in the hotel business.
 We learn that half the capital required may be obtained, if only the other half should be subscribed by the wealthier business men of Charlottetown. Here is a chance for the display of practical enterprise. The tide of tourist travel will, certainly, for the most part, stop short of P. E. Island, unless hotel accommodation similar to that which is being provided in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, be provided here; and we shall lose the profits on the purchases of tourists and the sale at home of the products which tourists consume, unless we supply the tourists first need of hotel accommodation.
 The matter, it seems to us, is one of importance to our men of business and owners of property in Charlottetown—one which should be promptly considered with a view to prompt action.

NOTES AND COMMENTS
 —Sir Wilfrid Laurier, it is announced, is going on a stumping tour, in Ontario and Quebec, in both of which provinces, as well as others, Liberal workers are going about in a manner to attract attention; and the Montreal Gazette remarks that "the general election idea does not seem to be entirely off yet."
 —At the recent meeting of the Trades and Labor Congress in Montreal President Smith created somewhat of a stir by declaring that, in his opinion "he was expressing the sentiments of the large majority of the members of the congress when he said that they had lost confidence in the word and the promise of the government at Ottawa."

—About two weeks ago it was announced that the salary of Yukon Commissioner Ogilvie had been increased to \$6,000, plus his living expenses. It is now stated that a new office of assistant commissioner is to be created, which will be given to one of Mr. Sifton's Manitoba friends. His salary is fixed at \$4,000 a year—with board, lodging and other expenses thrown in. Evidently the "growing time" is still with us.
