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\$599,000 FOR P.E.I.

\$8 Million Increase Offered to Provinces

OTTAWA (CP)—An \$7,446,000 increase next year in federal payments to the provinces was proposed Thursday night by Prime Minister Pearson.

The benefits would be shared among all provinces but in unequal amounts ranging from \$17,000 for Quebec to \$599,000 for Prince Edward Island.

Estimated additional revenues for the other provinces in the 1964-65 fiscal year are: New Brunswick \$3,282,000; Nova Scotia \$2,742,000; Ontario \$2,742,000; Quebec \$1,722,000; Manitoba \$7,023,000; Saskatchewan \$3,689,000; Alberta \$1,722,000.

Mr. Pearson made his proposal to provincial premiers on the evening of the third day of the federal-provincial conference.

BOOST DEATH SHARE
Some \$32,000,000 of the increased payments would result from a boost to 75 per cent in the provinces' share of death taxes, now shared 50-50 with Ottawa.

No change was proposed in provincial shares of other direct tax fields—now 17 per cent of personal income tax and 22 per cent of corporation income tax.

Another \$53,000,000 would result from a change in the complex formula for federal equalization payments to the provinces.

In essence, this change as described to reporters by Premier Roberts of Ontario would mean that Ontario provides 75 per cent of the shared direct tax fields up to the average provincial level in the top two provinces—understood to be Ontario and

British Columbia—but this amount would be offset by a complicated arrangement involving provincial revenues from natural resources.

Island-Born Doctor Dies In N.S. Town

NEW GLASGOW (CP)—John Geddie Ballem, who practised medicine here for 44 years, died in his home Thursday night.

Mr. Ballem was 84 years old. He was born in Scotland and came to New Glasgow in 1919. He retired last September.

Dr. Ballem was chief of staff at Aberdeen Hospital here for many years and introduced shock treatment at the Pictou County Hospital.

He was survived by his wife, two daughters and two sons.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at the Pictou County Memorial Chapel.

Interment will be in the Pictou County Memorial Park.

Mr. Ballem was a member of the Pictou County Memorial Association.

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Senior Housing Planned

OTTAWA (CP)—A six-pronged attack on the problem of housing for P.E.I.'s senior citizens will unfold this fall. Hon. Henry Wedge, minister of welfare, revealed here Thursday.

He announced that senior citizen housing projects were on the verge of approval for Souris, Kensington, Wellington, Aberdeen, O'Leary and Summerside.

The projects are part of a federal order in council that will give the green light to full scale construction as a part of P.E.I.'s winter works program.

Under the plan, the province will contribute 50 per cent of the funds and borrow the remaining 50 per cent under the limited dividend program of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The mortgage payments are spread over 40 years and are met by the senior citizens housing corporation, a provincial crown corporation. Specifically Mr. Wedge announced that contracts will be signed with builders for specified amounts once the federal department of national revenue gives the go-ahead.

The projects are as follows: Souris, George H. Cheverie, four units, \$29,985; Kensington, Malcolm MacLean, four units, \$31,985; Wellington, Almond Arsenault, six units, \$36,485; Aberdeen, Prinewy Enterprises Ltd., four units, \$30,985; O'Leary, Williams and Murphy Ltd., four units, \$35,810; Summerside, Williams and Murphy Ltd., twelve units, \$94,643.

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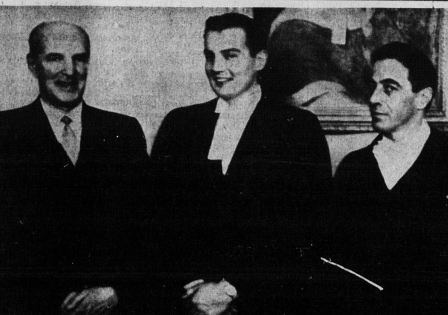
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CITY MAN ADMITTED TO BAR

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YOUTH GIVEN Life Term

TORONTO (CP)—Glen John Seip, 16, of Toronto, was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Ontario Supreme Court convicted of his non-capital murder in the big-room slaying of Ronald Brigg, 38, last July.

Seip cried when the all-male jury pronounced its verdict after deliberating five hours. Chief Justice James C. McRuer said he agreed with it.

Life imprisonment, he told the sobbing Seip, "does not mean you will never be outside prison again."
