MONDAY
Forty-eight healthy, happy and sun-tanned kids caught the Rocky Point Ferry for Charlottetown Saturday morning. They were on their way home from the Y.M.C.A. Holland Cove Camp where they had just spent twelve packed-full days of fun, games, swimming, etc.

The employment situation in the city received another nasty jolt on Saturday when between 75 and 80 men who had been on the payroll at City Hall as "casual labour" many of them since early in the Spring, were paid off and joined the ranks of unemployed.

This lay-off, following in the wake of a major reduction in the number of men engaged in the Bruce Stewart Ltd. plant, and the decrease in the number of female employees now required in the telephone service, has created a situation of major importance in the economic life of the city.

No permanent employee of the city has been affected by the reduction of staff, however, as the Street Committee, under the chairmanship of Councillor F. J. Storey, will submit to the City Council at a meeting this evening a street and sidewalk program which will provide for the unemployed.

TUESDAY
Yesterday afternoon, at about 1:30 o'clock, fire was discovered by Mr. George Walsh, a C.N.R. section man, beneath the Canadian National Railway station at Miscouche. Within a short time the flames had spread through the building, completely destroying the 70 by 30 foot wooden structure.

Cause of the fire is unknown. The station agent, Mr. Emmett Power, and his staff were not in the building, as they were on the day of the week he and the staff did not work since the five-day week came into effect.

Boy Scouts went into uniform and adopted a parade yesterday at Camp Bichan for a four day pre-campers session before leaving for the big camp at Ottawa. The Scouts will occupy the time in getting acquainted with each other and setting up their work for the National Jamboree to which all have been looking forward for months.

Mr. Fred Driscoll, Scout Master, and his assistants, Frank Costello, Gordon Kerr and Jim MacKenzie of Ottawa are in camp with the boys and will accompany them to Ottawa, leaving by the afternoon train on Thursday. Scouts from Aberdeen, O'Leary, Summerside, Kensington, Georgeville, Montague, Souris and Charlottetown make up the party.

Dr. C. B. Stewart, Professor of Epidemiology at Dalhousie University, has received the degree of Doctor of Public Health from Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, says a Dalhousie announcement. Although several medical authorities in the United States hold the degree, Dr. Stewart is believed to be the only one in Canada with that distinction.

The award follows five years of research in public health problems, a year of which was undertaken at Johns Hopkins, and the production of a thesis, "Studies on B.C.G. Vaccination". Dr. Stewart completed his thesis in Halifax, following his return from Johns Hopkins where he spent the academic year 1951-52. Dr. Stewart has also been granted a Fellowship in the American Public Health Association.

He won several prizes in each year of his medical course and on graduation in 1938, was awarded the University Medal for highest standing in his class. In addition to the regular work of his course, Dr. Stewart undertook studies in medical research and, in 1936, received the degree of Bachelor of Science.

Dr. MacDonald did not believe that the excessive cost would serve any useful purpose other than "to appease cranks." He paid tribute to the people supervising the new wading pool at Victoria Park as he noted that it was adequately managed and offered his congratulations to those in charge. The Health Officer also spoke of the situation existing on Upper Queen street regarding dumping and stated that boxes and other debris dumped there should be burned as the supplies of passed by were just serving to feed the many rats. He did not agree that any circus or fair should be permitted in Victoria Park as there are no adequate water or sewerage facilities available.

WEDNESDAY
Mr. Frank L. Dougan, general passenger agent of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways, Moncton, will retire at the end of the month. A native of Charlottetown, Mr. Dougan is one of the best known passenger traffic representatives on the continent. He commenced his railway service in March, 1904 at Georgetown.

Hon. George A. Drew, national leader of the Progressive Conservative Party and Opposition leader in the last Parliament, will speak in Charlottetown this evening in connection with the Federal election campaign. Born in 1894 in Guilph, Ont., Mr. Drew was Premier of Ontario for three terms before being named Conservative party leader in 1948.

Mr. Alex (Gertrude) White, Robinson, Maine, came to her death in the King's County Hospital last night. Dr. G. S. A. Inman presided as Coroner. Mr. S. S. Hessian, Q.C., appeared for the crown.

Strenuous opposition to any proposed plan of freight rate equalization which would make obtaining Canadian markets for the potato industry of this Province more difficult was voiced yesterday by Mr. Donald A. MacDonald. The speaker was presenting the views of the industry in a brief before the Board of Transport Commissioners who were holding a hearing here dealing with equalization of rates across Canada. As chairman of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board, Mr. MacDonald read the brief which was also signed by Mr. A. M. Pugh, Chairman of the New Brunswick Potato Marketing Board.

True bills were brought in by the Grand Jury at the July King's County assizes which commenced at Georgetown yesterday, respecting Ezra Arnold, Bristol, charged with the murder of his father, Harris L. Arnold, also of Bristol, and Russell Brown, Dingwells Mills, charged with wounding Allen Blaisdell of Dingwells Mills.

The Assizes are presided over by Justice Mark R. MacGuigan, appearing for the crown are Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, deputy attorney general, and Mr. S. S. Hessian, Q.C., crown prosecutor for King's County. Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C., is appearing for Ezra Arnold, and Mr. Lester P. O'Donnell for Russell Brown.

FRIDAY
On July 6, at a special convocation commemorating the Silver Jubilee of the Extension Department of the University of St. Francis Xavier, Antigonish, Nova Scotia, one Islander was among the 25 co-operative workers who received honorary degrees conferred by the Chancellor of the University, Most Reverend J. R. MacDonald, Bishop of Antigonish. Those honored were all prominent figures in the fields of adult educa-

tion and labor, and were selected from all parts of Canada and the United States. Mr. Louis B. MacGuire, Morell, P. E. I., was the only Islander so honored and was granted the Degree of Master of Arts honoris causa.

At the Provincial Building yesterday afternoon, 44 first-class Boy Scouts were inspected prior to their departure to the second Canadian Jamboree at Ottawa.

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, addressed the boys briefly. Present also was Hon. Eugene Cloutier, Minister of Industries and Natural Resources.

Leaders of the Island group are Provincial Commissioner P. A. Driscoll and executive Commissioner Gordon Kerr.

The National Employment Office is paying benefits to upwards of four hundred claimants at the present time, which is at least 150 more than at the same time last year.

The total was increased during the past week when more than thirty girls were laid off by the Telephone Company following the inception of the dial service in Charlottetown. Helping to swell the figures also are the considerable number of men who lost their employment when ship repair work terminated at Bruce Stewart's some weeks ago. A proportion of these men were country residents, who moved to the city and whose term of work at Bruce Stewart's gave them enough contributions to the Unemployment Insurance fund, to entitle them to benefits.

A very impressive ceremony yesterday marked the 150th anniversary of the landing of the Brudenell pioneers at Brudenell Island, King's County, as McLaren-Gordon descendants gathered from near and far to pay tribute and bestow honor to the cherished memory of those pioneers.

To further commemorate the occasion a plaque was unveiled which had been placed on the island in 1903 by William A. Lewis of Cardigan.

The celebration was opened by Mr. Douglas McLaren, Montague, chairman of the committee. After the singing of the doxology, the chairman called on Rev. Melvin Aitken, of Hamilton, Ontario, who delivered a stirring eulogy on those pioneers who had left their homelands to found a new way of life in a new land under the leadership of James McLaren and Donald Gordon. Their descendants, he said, are making their presence felt in every land to which they have come from these shores, and this was an occasion for all to rededicate themselves to the high ideals for which they lived and died.
