Toronto Marksman Wins Shoot-Off For Medal In DCRA MacDonald Match

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 15—(CP)—Maj. Desmond Burke, 48-year-old Toronto and Ottawa rifleman, today won the shoot-off to win the silver medal in the MacDonald Match at the 83rd annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot.

Both the veteran riflemen posted scores of 124, one off the possible, from 300 and 600 yards. Ten rounds were fired at the 300 yard range and 15 rounds from the 600 yards.

In the shoot-off, from 300 yards, Maj. Burke fired five shots into the bulls-eye, compared with four for FO. Gregory, who dropped to an inner four on his first.

The shoot-off was held under a hot sun and little breeze on these ranges, 14 miles west of Ottawa.
