Miss Emily DesRoches was a recent visitor at the shore.

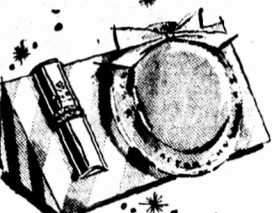
Alban Gallant left for Montreal on Dec. 7th, where he will undergo medical treatment at the Montreal General Hospital.
