

2 Major Upsets Feature National Tennis Tourney

By WILL GRIMSLEY, FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP)—The two red hot favorites, Alex Olmedo and Neale Fraser, moved resolutely into the men's quarter-finals Wednesday and a big upset by Earl Buchholz Jr. emerged as the dark horse of the U.S. national tennis championships.

The fast-moving outside is Ron Holmberg, 21-year-old Tulane University senior from Flatbush who scored a second straight upset by beating seventh-seeded Earl Buchholz Jr. of St. Louis in a carryover match 6-3, 7-5, 8-10, 6-3.

Earlier, Holmberg, who five years ago was acclaimed the boy wonder of American tennis, had come of competitive age by erasing former Wimbledon champion Dick Savitt, also in five sets.

Champ Joe Brown Stops Gale Kerwin

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Lightweight champion Joe Brown of Houston, Tex., scored a technical knockout Wednesday night over Canadian welterweight champion Gale Kerwin of Ottawa in 1:50 of the fourth round.

Brown weighed 139½ and Kerwin 140 for the nationally televised scrap which halted abruptly as the Canadian suffered a bad gash over his left eye.

Referee Jack Dempsey, the former heavyweight champion, halted the scrap, called the ringside physician to examine Kerwin and awarded the verdict to Brown.

Kerwin had been out of action almost a year and had counted on using this bout as a stepping stone. He wept in his corner after the bout was halted.

The only knockdown came in the second round when Kerwin was felled by a right to the head. He was up at six but the eight count was mandatory.

The Canadian came back strong in the third and was awarded the round by all three judges. He was punching effectively in the fourth until Brown's straight right crashed into his eyes.

The over-the-weight match gave Brown his 74th victory and his 34th by knockout against 16 losses, nine draws and two no-contests. Kerwin's record now reads 26 victories, nine losses and one draw.

A crowd of 3,182 witnessed the charity show in the Ohio State Fairgrounds Coliseum where the temperature was near the 90 mark.

Brown, in his dressing room, said: "Kerwin is a pretty good boxer but he can't hit. He kept pawing at me as he stepped in and that was wrong. He needs more experience."

Kerwin, still weeping after his shower, said: "This was my dream fight and I lost it. I'm sorry it happened this way. I was coming strong and the punch didn't hurt me a bit."

White Sox, Tribe Notch Victories

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chicago's daring base running panicked Washington into three errors in a four-run seventh inning rally Wednesday night for a 5-1 victory, but the White Sox still lost a half game of their American League lead to the rampaging Cleveland Indians.

Cleveland swept a doubleheader from Baltimore to move within four and one-half games of Chicago.

It was the 11th straight Chicago victory over the last place Senators. Bob Shaw, who downed Washington for the fifth time this season, was the winner with a seven-inning lead.

The league leaders needed only one outfield hit in their two scoring innings, stealing a base and luring the Senators into three errors while beating the ball into the dirt and scampering around the bases.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Striking Cleveland Indians continued their late-season drive to stay in the American League pennant race by sweeping a doubleheader from Baltimore-Orioles Wednesday night, 3-2 and 4-1.

The twin victory, which extended Cleveland's winning skid to six, enabled the Indians to gain half a game on the first place Chicago White Sox. Chicago defeated Washington 5-1 to stay 4½ games ahead.

Lefty Jack Harstman allowed his former Oriole teammates five hits in the first game, which Cleveland won with an unearned run in the ninth inning.
