The SNAPSHOT GUILD

Don't Forget to Turn the Key or Else—?



It is a rare occurrence when a double exposure does not spoil two good pictures and waste film.

The above picture of a Broddingnagian young lady miraculously reclining on the surface of the sea amidst a fleet of sailboats reminds us that while modern cameras are indeed close to being robots in their performance, they still demand the cooperation of human intelligence in order to function with the result expected.

The photograph is the curious consequence of a double exposure, illustrating the fact that the film behind your camera lens will not move over for the next picture by the exercise of its own free will. About that it is totally indifferent. You have to perform this operation yourself. If you forget it, and find that you have twice or thrice exposed the same frame of film, you may by chance get a picture as amusing and worth keeping as the one above, but in most cases you will have a meaningless jumble of superimposed shapes and shadows that will interest nobody, not even a Cubist. (C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, May 22—Mild recovery in late dealings on Montreal Stock Exchange today, wiped out some of the early losses and enabled the market to close with minor advances and declines about even.

Liquors had little call in the late buying and closed with fractional losses, while paints at 1/2 links also eased. Metals firmed as steady demand while construction and utilities were mostly unchanged.

National Breweries slipped 1-2 for the biggest loss in the group.

Canadian Industrial Alcohol and Distillers Seagram each lost 1-8 with the latter closing at 24. Brewhing Corporation dropped 1-4.

In the metals Noranda and Consolidated Smelters were up 1-4 and 1/2, Inger 3-78. At 46 3-4. Inter-national Nickel had advanced 1-4.

Canadian Pacific Railway gained 1-4 to 12 1-4 and others higher were International Power, Montreal Power in the utilities and Gypsum and Canada Cement in the constructions.

There are many things in my life for which I am thankful; but the one for which I am most thankful is that is way my good fortune to have been "born a n d bred" on Abegweit... that beautiful name for Prince Edward Island which it should never have lost. I know perfectly well that L. M. Montgomery deep down in my heart is a great pity for everyone who was NOT born on Prince Edward Island. Can it ever be made up to them?

It was my further good fortune to have lived on the "north shore" of "the Island," where I could gaze every day and night on the splendid pageant of the St. Lawrence gulf... splendid in its ever-changing beauty of dawn and noon and midnight, of storm and calm, wind and rain, starlight, moonlight, sunset! I shall remember in the halls of eternity some sunsets I have seen over New London harbour.

We children of my day almost lived on the shore. There were so many things we could do there. It was a world in itself. Bathe on the sand beach... wade around the rocks... climb the red cliffs and poke seawallows out of their nests. watch the white gulls soaring... gather pebbles, dulse, sea-moss, kelp, snails, mussels... run races over the sand... dig wells in it... build castles... climb the shining faces of the dunes... slide down in a merry smother of sand... pile up driftwood... make shore pies... peep through the spyglass at the fishing boats... space falleth me to tell of all the things we did on that far-away shore of long ago.

And the children living there today can do just those things. For that old shore is unchanged amid all the changes of the years. Empires have toppled... a world has passed away... since I, as a child, played on the silver beaches of Prince Edward Island. But they are still there... still beautiful... still calling to their exiles with a voice we always hear. And in our dreams we go back to them.
