## New Group Interested In Nfld. Asbestos Project

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier J. R. Smallwood announced Wednesday that a new group of investors has joined with Advocate Mines Limited of Toronto to develop an asbestos fibre ore body in northern Newfoundland. M. J. Boylen, president of Advocate Mines, was quoted as saying that at least \$1,000,000 will be spent at the outset to explore and develop the ore body at Baie Verte, Nfld. These funds would be made available by the group which would include Patino Limited of Canada, Amet Corporation Incorporated, Financiere Belge de l'Asbestos-Ciment S. A., and Canadian Johns-Manville Company Limited, the announcement said. Canadian Johns-Manville, which operates asbestos mines in Quebec and Northern Ontario, had contracted to manage and operate the Newfoundland project with the assistance of the technical and management skills of its associates. Under present plans exploration and development work would take about two years, and construction of a mill and other facilities would require about another 18 months. 3,000 TON CAPACITY The mill would have an initial capacity of 3,000 tons of asbestos ore a day. It was planned to ship the asbestos fibre from the Baie

Verte area in ocean going cargo ships to world markets. Mr. Smallwood said the asbestos ore body is one of several located in a 1,500 square mile area in the Baie Verte region of the Newfoundland peninsula on Newfoundland's northeast coast. Mineral rights to this area were held through a concession granted by the Newfoundland government in 1955. The asbestos fibre in this deposit was of the chrysotile type. Tests indicated that the fibre was an excellent grade for use in the manufacture of asbestos-cement products. He said officials of Advocate Mines estimate that it will take about 3 1/2 years before the ore body will be ready for commercial production. By that time the world-wide demand for asbestos fibre was expected to absorb Canada's asbestos output, including that of Newfoundland. ASBESTOS, Que. (CP)—The decision of Canadian Johns-Manville Company Limited to help develop an asbestos fibre ore body in northern Newfoundland will have no effect on the company's operations at Asbestos, Que., and Munro, Ont., a company spokesman said Wednesday. Karl V. Lindell, vice-president and general manager, was commenting on an announcement of the development by Premier J. R. Smallwood of Newfoundland. Mr. Lindell said "our plans for the future call for strengthening our operations at our Asbestos and Munro mines."

## Bangor Airmen Serves With R.C.A.F. At Base In Germany

METZ, France. — When he glances up at one of the RCAF's Air Division high altitude fighters weaving its white vapor trail 40,000 feet or more in the sky, Leading Aircraftman Ira D. Findlayson of Bangor, P. E. I. can feel that it's crew may be breathing the oxygen he helped to make, and may be depending on it for survival. As an instrument technician at one of the RCAF's NATO air bases No. 3 Fighter Wing, Zweibrücken, Germany, LAC Findlayson helps to operate one of the Air Division's mobile oxygen producing units. Operated by its own self-contained diesel plant, the unit pumps air into a series of compressors. The air passes through various stages during which gases other than oxygen are removed. After being reduced to liquid form by powerful refrigeration units, the oxygen remaining is turned back into gaseous form and fed under pressure into heavy steel cylinders. A complex series of tests ensures that the oxygen meets rigid purity standards upon which the lives of the aircrew depend. LAC Findlayson, who is the son of Mr. Leroy Findlayson, Ban-

gor, P. E. I., joined the Air Force in 1952 and took his basic training as an instrument technician at RCAF Camp Borden. Prior to his overseas posting in May 1956, he served at RCAF Station Greenwood, N.S.
