Local and Other Items.

LOTS OF FREIGHT.—The Pictou Advocate says: Station-master Webster is a busy man these days. Over sixty cars of P. E. Island freight were lying in the railway yard on Wednesday, while the Stanley and Princess had full cargoes.

MEDAL AND PLAN MISSING.—The bronze medal presented to the town of Sydney by the society of colonial wars in 1893, is missing from the town office. A plan of the waterworks system valued at \$140, is also missing. A committee, composed of the mayor, recorder, and two councilors is investigating.

GOOD WORK.—The excellent manner in which the reports of the various departments of the Provincial Government have been printed by Mr. John Coombs, Queen's Printer, is occasioning comment. Evidently Mr. Coombs has done everything in his power to maintain his reputation in this regard.

BURNED TO DEATH.—A fatal accident occurred at River Burgeoise, N. S., on Saturday last, when the six year-old daughter of Joseph Burke lost her life. The child in company with other, was amusing herself by lighting fires with having, when suddenly her thin clothing caught in the blaze. Her father reached her in about three minutes, but in that short space of time she was burned to such an extent that death came within ten hours.

SHIPPING DISASTERS.—The administration of the Bureau Veritas has just published the list of maritime disasters during the month of February, 1899, concerning all flags, as follows: Sailing vessels reported lost: 19 American, 1 Austrian, 27 British, 2 Chinese, 3 Danish, 1 Dutch, 3 French, 2 German, 1 Greek, 6 Italian, 1 Japanese, 8 Norwegian, 3 Portuguese, 4 Russian, 5 Spanish, 3 Swedish: Total 89. In this number are included 9 vessels reported missing. Steamer lost: 3 American, 29 British, 1 Danish, 2 Dutch, 2 French, 2 German, 1 Italian, 2 Japanese, 1 Norwegian, 2 Swedish; total 44. In this number are included 3 steamers reported missing. Causes of losses—Sailing vessels: Stranding, 36; collision, 6; fire, 3; foundered, 5; abandoned 12; condemned, 18; and missing, 9; total, 89. Steamers: Stranding 17; collision, 3; fire, 2; foundered, 1; abandoned, 3; condemned, 15; and missing 3; total 44.

Our Immense Railway System.

The railway system in the United States employs 36,900 locomotives, 26,900 passenger cars and 8,000 mail and baggage cars. These figures seem large till the number of freight cars is stated which is 1,350,000. A passenger train consisting of locomotive, tender, baggage and six passenger cars, with their contents, is estimated to weigh about 184 tons. Freight trains sometimes reach a weight of 550 tons. An ordinary passenger car costs from \$4,000 to \$5,000 and a sleeping car anywhere from \$10,000 to \$20,000. The system, with its gigantic equipment, is practically the growth of a single generation. With the additions of another quarter or half a century posterity ought to stand and gaze at its stupendous proportions. But it will probably be gradually educated out of all its capacities of wonder, as we have been out of many of our own.—New York Tribune.

The burglar who does several "jobs" and eludes the officers of the law is a keen observer, a man of forethought, and one whose executive ability is unquestioned. Houses are not entered because they have brownstone fronts, nor are stores broken into by the professional thief without an investigation. When the skillful burglar is to do a "job," he studies the habits of the resident or proprietor. In a case in Troy a few years ago a jewelry store was robbed. Apparently there was not a clew. Detectives were placed on the case and named the thieves by the method employed in getting into the store, and subsequently the thieves were convicted. Certain burglars always enter a cellar and come up through stairs, floor or trapdoors. Others have skeleton keys. Some break in rear and others front doors. In the robbery above referred to the two thieves had been in Troy three successive Saturday nights. They had fastened a silk thread on all entrances in such a way that if any one entered or left the store the thread would be broken. Thus the burglars learned that the proprietor and clerks did not visit the store after closing Saturday night until Sunday. The fourth Saturday night they "cracked" the safe. Except for their "methodical" way of entering (by the cellar) no suspicion would have attached itself to them.—Troy Times.

LONDON, April 23.—The bill to repeal the Irish Crimes Act was defeated for the third reading in the House of Commons by a vote of 270 to 114. The Attorney-General for Ireland, the Right Hon. J. Atkinson, pointed out the efficacy of the Act, the existence of which, he asserted, had brought about the present peace. All rejected the Attorney General added, in the wisdom and justice of the Act, and he demanded the retention of this instrument, "ready for use in case of emergency."

BERLIN, April 22.—Sergeant-Major Albrecht, of the One Hundred and Twenty-Ninth Regiment, has been arrested at Bromberg, Prussia, about seventy miles from Posen, and has been taken in chains to Spandau, nine miles from here, where the state prison is situated. The prisoner is charged with high treason in furnishing Russian agents with detailed plans for mobilizing the German army.
