There is no need of dissolving the powder in water until the disease makes its appearance. The recipe is: Forty grains sulphuric acid, dissolved in a quart of cold water, one teaspoonful every hour.

The consequence is that the St. John stevedores have been materially reduced and the dealers here who have any left have advanced the price \$1, so that now P. E. I heavy mess is bringing \$22 per barrel. Messrs. Turnbull & Co. wired to Halifax yesterday to ascertain what could be purchased there, and in reply were informed that only 300 barrels could be procured, as the people who held any refused to sell. A message to Charlottetown brought the reply that the city was bare of pokes.

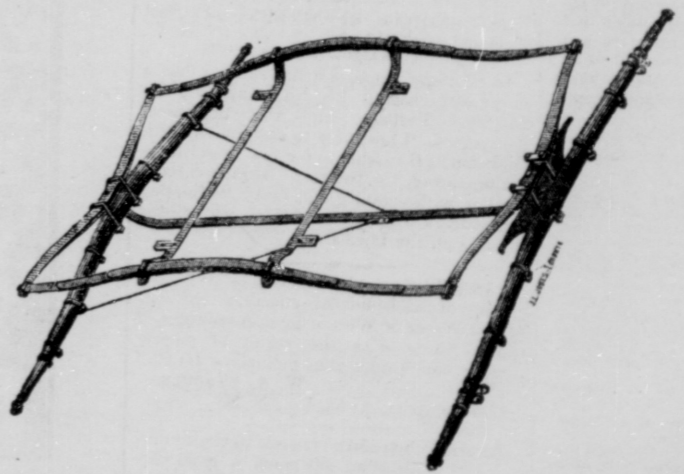
