POINTER FOR THE POWERS

To Pay Off Turkish Indemnity.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 24.—Lord Salisbury has suggested that the Powers cooperate in a scheme to enable Greece to guarantee the interest on a loan to pay off the Turkish indemnity by international control of the Hellenic revenue. The Powers are considering the proposal.

TRADE WITH GREAT BRITAIN

Exports of the United States.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—The forthcoming annual report of the Bureau of Statistics will show the total valuation of imports and domestic exports of the United States by countries for the year ended June 30th, 1897. The largest trade was done with Great Britain, the imports aggregating \$167,947,829, and the exports \$478,448,592. The next in volume was with Germany.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

TORONTO, Aug. 22.—The shipment of two hundred and fifty-six Massey-Harris bicycles was made this morning to Australia. They were valued at thirty-one thousand dollars.

TORONTO, Aug. 22.—Five children were drowned this afternoon by the upsetting of a scow. Twenty children were on the scow, going to a small island about a hundred yards from the shore. Half way across the children climbed on the railing and the scow upset with the above mentioned result.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 22.—The Costa Rican government has asked the United States Mint to coin six hundred thousand colons, under the former Government's new system of coinage, favorable to gold. The colon is equivalent to 46 cents. The ratio at which the Costa Rican coinage is made is 32 to 1 as between gold and silver.

HALIFAX, Aug. 22.—Comel for the Canadian government are in the city for the opening of the Behring Sea claims on Tuesday. The commission meets for final argument on the claims put in by Canadian sealing vessels against the United States government. The claims amount to over three hundred thousand dollars.

ATHENS, Aug. 22.—A great meeting of over three thousand people held here today adopted an address to King George urging him and the government to reject the proposed peace treaty between Greece and Turkey, and to resume the hostilities which were interrupted by the truce. The entire press, however, and a great majority of the public at Athens condemn the action for resumption of war.

HONOLULU, August 15.—The American flag has not yet been raised over Hawaii, and there is no indication that it will be. Just before the last steamer left for San Francisco, on July 27th, it was rumored that on August 2nd the United States minister would take possession of the islands. He was to receive definite instructions off the steamer Mouna, arriving at Honolulu, July 29th, but evidently they failed to come, as the raising of the flag has not since been talked of.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 22.—The peace conference adjourned its session today, owing to the non-receipt by some of the ambassadors of instructions from their governments. Lord Salisbury, it is stated, maintains the attitude assumed by him with reference to the evacuation of Thessaly by the Turkish forces; while the German government threatens to withdraw from the concert of the powers unless the Turks be allowed to continue the occupation of the province until the indemnity agreed upon be paid by Greece.

VICTORIA, Aug. 22.—The steamer Geo. E. Starr called at Union today, having on board a number of Klondykers. One man has \$16,000. He is from Seattle, but his name was not obtainable. Four Victorians have between them \$25,000. They only went in last May and will return immediately. They say they can get through to Dawson City. The Starr left Union at 3.30 p. m. for Seattle. Only one operator was at Union and it is consequently impossible to get definite news.

NORTH SYDNEY, Aug. 22.—The Gloucester fishing schooner Marathon was abandoned on Monday last, in a sinking condition off Cape North, about fifteen miles. The vessel was bound on a netting trip to North Bay, and started leaking so badly that she filled to the hatches. The crew left her in dories and after rowing about for a day and a night, landed at Bay St. Lawrence. They arrived here yesterday by the steamer Arcadia, and will be sent home by the American consul.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Advices to the Agricultural Department confirm the prediction of a considerable deficiency in the European wheat crop, while rye, which is the chief bread grain of Eastern Europe, is also short. This fact, as well as the wheat deficiency, will tend to restrict the exportations of the latter from those European countries which usually have a surplus of that grain. As to non-European countries other than United States, their aggregate contribution to the European supply will be materially affected by the fact that India, denuded by the famine, will have practically no wheat to export.

LAGOS, Africa, August 22.—The King of Benin, who surrendered on August 5th to the British authorities after wandering in the bush since the capture of Benin city by the British in February last, as a result of the massacre of an expedition under Consul Philips, entered Benin city, preceded by a messenger bearing a white flag and followed by eight hundred unarmed blacks, ten chiefs, twenty wives and a reed band playing native music. On August 7th the acting political resident received the king's obeisance in front of the Palaver house. The king was covered with ornaments and his arms were supported on each side by natives. About 400 naked natives and many chiefs formed a circle about the king. The latter at first expressed a desire to make his submission privately to the resident, but the British representative refused and the king, after having consulted with his chiefs, made an obeisance, rubbing his forehead three times upon the ground. Ten of his most important chiefs did the same and the ceremony was concluded.
