

Nehru Successor Only Temporary

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—The death of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru Wednesday left the nation in a leadership limbo, with four persons considered possible successors.

The swearing-in of interim home minister Gulzarilal Nanda, senior member of Nehru's government, as prime minister was only an "interim arrangement," a government official said.

The decision on a successor, Nehru lies with the ruling Congress party of Parliament, which is to meet within a few days to name a successor to Nehru as party leader. He, of course, will become prime minister.

A Congress party spokesman said the party executive will meet Friday morning and the party will hold a national convention Friday night to name a new party leader.

If Nehru himself had a favorite to succeed him, he kept it a secret. He said he hoped the Congress party could make his own choice.

THREE ILL POWER
Sixty-two-year-old Nehru fell ill in January, three ministers have held effective power.
