Some East Point History

By Mrs. Clarence Rose The early settlers of East Point were of Scottish descent. They landed on the sand dunes which skirt the shores of the Island between Red Point and East Point, and hastily set to work constructing camps, using poles and boughs covered with birch bark. After a short time has elapsed, each family was given land of their own, where they built log cabins. For storing the abundance of the produce which they derived from their farms, they dug cellars, traces of which can still be found.

McGregors Point, about a quarter of a mile from where the emigrants landed in 1808-1810, possesses much historic interest. Pieces of pottery and rust eaten implements found by these early settlers indicate that this was once a fishing village inhabited by the French. Another circumstance bears out this belief too, as it is reported that seventy years ago, Mr. McGregor (for whom the point was named) saw a French schooner anchored off shore, and a number of foreign looking men were digging below his home. Next day an old rusty crock, badly broken was found lying beside the large excavation made by these men, and the Schooner had departed.

Nfld. Coastal Vessel Sinks
