LATEST FROM THE SEAT OF WAR

Col. Pilcher's Command Defeats the Boers.

ONE HUNDRED CANADIANS IN THE FIGHT.

They Give a Good Account of themselves—French Holds Colesburg.—Money for the Artillery.—Opinion in London.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

BOER LAAGER CAPTURED.

BELMONT, Jan. 3.—The Canadians have had their first experience of active warfare, the Toronto Company having been with Colonel Pilcher in his defeat of the Boers at the Sunnyside Laager yesterday.

Our boys, according to the reports which reached this point from Dover farm where Col. Pilcher and his command are now camped did good work in supporting the guns.

The men started out from here with Col. Pilcher on a reconnaissance which the Colonel reports has been successful in every respect.

The force consisted of 100 Canadians, the French company and 200 Queenslanders, with two guns and a horse battery under Major DeRougemont, forty Mounted Infantry under Lieut. Regan and 200 of the Cornwall Light Infantry.

At six o'clock on Monday morning the force appeared at a spot where a laager of Boers were reported.

Col. Pilcher, on approaching, detached Major DeRougemont with the guns, the Toronto and Mounted Infantry to work towards the right, making a turning movement himself with the Queenslanders towards the south of the Boer position.

British shells were the first indication of the presence of our troops.

The Boers left their laager and opened fire, but the Queenslanders completing the movement the laager was captured with forty prisoners.

Colonel Pilcher reports that he had two men killed and a lieutenant wounded.

None of these were Canadians. The other companies of Canadians are all here, and in good health.

FRENCH HOLDS COLESBREG.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Unexpected developments of the situation have occurred at Colesburg. A central news correspondent says that the Boers returned with reinforcements during the night and occupied a position from which they were driven by General French on Monday.

Further particulars of Colonel Pilcher's

successful action show how much it was due to the Colonial troops.

MONEY FOR ARTILLERY.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The Daily Mail makes the following statement this morning: We understand that the defence committee of the Cabinet, after careful consideration of the question of the defence of the Empire, particularly with regard to artillery, will shortly call for the expenditure of £5,000,000 to make good the deficiencies and to place the nation on a par with other great powers.

OPINION IN LONDON.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—General French's exploit in surprising the Boers camp at Colesburg was not the only cheering incident at the opening of the new year. Col. Pilcher, with a force of mounted infantry from the line of Lord Methuen's communications, attacked and defeated a Dutch commando at Sunnyside, thirty miles north-west of Belmont taking a laager and forty prisoners.

This is a fresh proof of the efficiency of mounted troops in South African warfare.

Lord Methuen's line is secure against raiding where scouting is so well done that the presence of the enemy thirty miles away is known and troops are mobile enough to strike an encampment at long distance from the line which they are guarding.

Colonel Pilcher belongs to the famous Fighting Fifth, which was caught in ambush under General Gatacre; but he is a veteran in Africa and is on special service.

His casualties were confined to the Australian troops, three being killed and one officer wounded.

An Indian Offer.

BOMBAY, Jan. 2.—The war office has accepted an offer made by the Maharajah of Kashmir to furnish 300 trained battery horses for use in South Africa.
