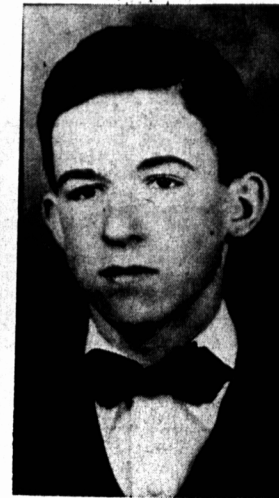


Prince of Wales 4th Year Graduates

Submit To Lie Test

LA CROSSE, Wis., (AP)—Twenty high school students and two teachers took lie-detector tests Thursday as mass questionings began here in an effort to find a clue to the disappearance of 15-year-old Evelyn Hartley.

District attorney John Bosshard gave no indication of what results were obtained, but said the tests will continue until more than 1,700 teachers and students in the city have been questioned.

Miss Hartley, daughter of Prof. and Mrs. Richard Hartley disappeared last Oct. 24 while baby-sitting for a neighbor. Authorities found indications of violence, but said later they were at a complete loss as to further clues.

Officials Welcome Seaway Bill Passing

MONTREAL, (CP)—Shipping and business officials Thursday night expressed approval that the St. Lawrence seaway bill has been passed by the United States House of Representatives.

"They welcomed the participation of the U. S. in the seaway, although many feared the project would prove a 'mixed blessing to this city.'"

J. P. Boyle, president of the Shipping Federation of Canada and head of shipping, Ltd., said approval of the project was "inevitable."

"Although there still is strong sectional opposition to it, we can't impede progress," he said. "I would say the seaway will benefit all of Canada."

"It is hard to predict now what effect the project will have on the port of Montreal; some fear this port may be bypassed as a great shipping centre."
