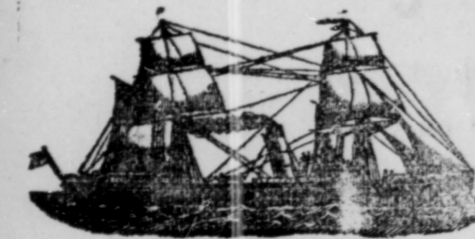

THE COLLEGE AGAIN.

No explanation has been afforded the tax-paying public concerning the superintendence of the new building. Nor are we enlightened as to the cause of the difference between the tender on Chappell's plan and the price of the contract subsequently made with McDonald & Schurman for the erection of a building according to the revised plan. It seems clear that the increase of \$9000 was made "in a moment of weakness." But the contract price of \$28,000,—ten thousand dollars more than the amount authorized by the Legislature,—will not by any means cover the cost of the building. A striking proof of the truth of THE EXAMINER's statement of the case is found in The Canadian Contract Record, published at Toronto. We quote: "Charlottetown, P. E. I. The Government have accepted plans prepared by C. B. Chappell, architect, for the new Prince of Wales College and Normal School and have let the contract to McDonald & Schurman. The cost of the building will be about \$35,000. There were four sets of plans submitted to the Government for the building."

The person who supplied the particulars for this paragraph knew what he was writing about when, with the contract before him, he declared that "the cost of the building will be about \$35,000." Still, we shall be surprised if any explanation or apology be afforded our surprised and offended tax-payers.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—President Schurman announces that the work of the four year course in the New York State College of Forestry, at Cornell University, will embrace civil engineering, higher mathematics, chemistry, physics, entomology, botany, geology, etc., and all instruction will be given in Ithaca, with the possible exception of the spring term of the senior year. Of course there will be practice work in the woods, but this will, for obvious reasons, be done during the summer vacations. During the remainder of the year the professors and students of the new College will reside in Ithaca except for short excursions to lumber camps, mills, etc.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Moncton Times: The little word "cider" was put in the Plebiscite question for a purpose. And it appears to have done its work to a great extent.

Montreal Gazette: Mr Fisher is the ore member of the plebiscite Government who appears on the platform as an advocate of prohibition. All his colleagues are either silently or actively against him. In this province especially, they and their leading supporters are pronouncedly against interference from Ottawa with the existing state of affairs.

Montreal Gazette: Col. Domville says the Stikkeen route "is not worth a hairpin." He voted for it, but is glad he said nothing in support of the scheme. Evidence is accumulating to make it clear to everybody that the Senate saved the Government from mortgaging the gold lands of the Yukon for a railway which would have been of little or no use to anybody.

Montreal Star: The death of ex-Secretary and ex-ambassador Bayard, at a time when the friendly feelings between Britain and the United States, which he did so much to promote, has become one of the conspicuous new facts of the new day, is not without a touch of pathos in addition to the inevitable sorrow at the death of a great man. Ambassador Bayard's speeches in Britain were a generous seed which is now bearing a magnificent harvest; and it is a pity that he could not have lived to see the reaping.

WITHOUT A PRECEDENT.

Some patient reckoner has compiled a list of Gladstone's "onlies," which may or may not be exhaustive. He was the only man who ever began so early a public career which continued so late; he was the only man who was ever orator, statesman, theologian, author, litterateur and linguist, and first rate in all; he was the only man who ever carried a great constructive measure of legislation (the Irish Home Rule bill of 1893) through the House of Commons after he was eighty years old; he was the only man holding and expressing positive opinions for seventy years who never made a personal enemy; and he was the only man not holding a seat in parliament in honor of whom at his death the House of Commons ever adjourned. It has been truly said, "These things are without a precedent, but there has been no precedent for Mr. Gladstone himself."—Youth's Companion.

Lord Kitchener of Khartoum is suggested as the proper title for the Sirdar, when he is called to the House of Lords.

The Anglican Church of this province, which long counted Mr. Robert Hamilton, of Quebec, as a wise adviser and liberal friend, has been well remembered in the distribution he made of his wealth. Bishop's College will be greatly helped by the bequest of \$45,000 in its favor, while the gifts to missions in the will will help many stations in the sparsely occupied sections of the province, where help is mostly needed and can do most good. Mr Hamilton was a fine specimen of a fine type of man and won respect in every sphere where duty or social intercourse made him familiar.—Montreal Gazette.

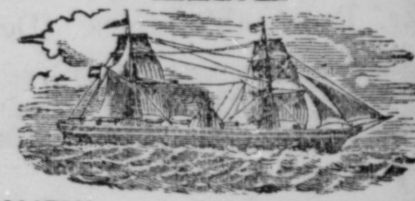
