

Chicago, Toronto And Detroit Win Saturday; Bruins Lose Two Men

TORONTO, (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs blanked the fourth-place Boston Bruins 3-0 Saturday night in a walloping National Hockey League game that resulted in broken legs to two Bruins stars.

The Leafs, unbeaten in their last eight games and hard on the heels of the league-leading Montreal Canadiens, gave goalkeeper Harry Lumley his first shutout of the 1953-54 season. A crowd of 13,302 saw the game.

It was a disastrous loss for coach Lynn Patrick, who juggled his lines to fill the gap left by the injured Milt Schmidt. Veteran defenseman Bill Quackenbush and leftwinger Real Chevrefils, suffered broken right legs.

Quackenbush, 31-year-old mainstay rearguard, received a fracture above the ankle when he fell into the boards after being checked by Toronto leftwinger Sid Smith in the second period. Chevrefils, in his third season with Boston, broke his left just below the knee when he slammed into Toronto defenseman Fern Flaman late in the third period.

There was no penalty on either play. Quackenbush and Chevrefils were taken to hospital, where their condition Sunday was described as good. They will be laid up for at least two months.

THE HAWKS were able to take a mile more advantage of their opportunities. Interest picked up near the end when Canadiens turned loose an all-out drive that was turned back largely by the fine goal-tending of Al Rollins. Goalie Gerry McNeil was taken from the Montreal net in the last minute.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Detroit Red Wings, trailing by a goal after two periods, rallied for third-period tallies by Glen Skov, Vic Stasiuk and Metro Prystal to defeat New York Rangers 3-2 Saturday night before Madison Square Garden's largest hockey crowd of the season, 13,762.

After Wally Hergesheimer put New York in front early in the second period, it looked as if rookie goalie Johnny Bower might chalk up his first National Hockey League shutout.

But the Wings swarmed around the New York nets at the start of the third period and their efforts paid off.

First Skov scored on a 15-footer, after taking passes from Bob Goldham and Marty Pavelich at 2:46. Then at 8:45, Stasiuk took a Pavelich relay and registered from just outside the crease. A little more than a minute later, Prystal cleanly beat Bower from 25-feet out.

With only 30 seconds remaining, Camille Henry, Ranger freshman, drew his club up to 3-2. He drove a Paul Ronty rebound past the diving Terry Sawchuk in the Detroit cage.

The win was the Wings' second over New York in three starts this year. Their other game ended in a tie.

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Atomic Power Plant Being Built in Ontario

TORONTO, (CP)—An atomic reactor is being built for the generation of power in Ontario, Premier Frost and hydro chairman Robert Saunders announced Thursday.

The reactor, now under construction at Chalk River, Canada's atomic plant on the Ottawa river, is being built to ensure the future power supply of the province.

A three-man staff now is at Chalk River and a co-ordinator is soon to be appointed by Ontario Hydro. The program will require about two years at a cost of approximately \$100,000 a year.

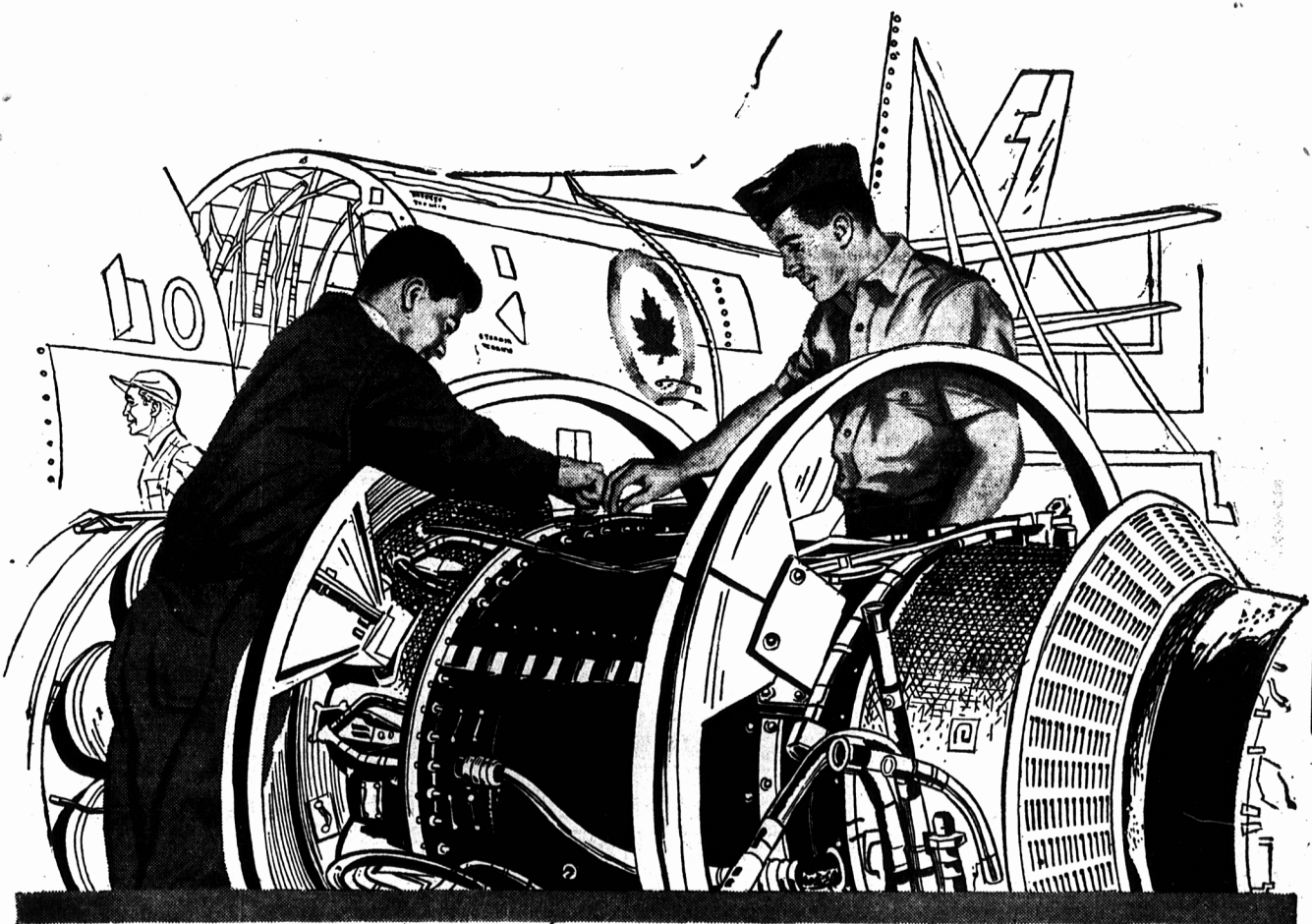
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LAC ERIC CRAIG
