### West Prince Coast Hit By Wind-Lashed Seas

Gale force winds, sleet and heavy rain buffeted West Prince County most of the day yesterday bringing high tides and heavy seas which damaged coastline areas.  
Roads were treacherous from the sleet most of the day but were clearing last night. They were not blocked at any time.  
Rough seas caused flooding and damage to breakwaters and wharfs, but none of the damage was reported of a major nature. Shortly after noon yesterday a tremendous gust of wind blew in three large plate glass windows at Myrick's store on Main Street in Alberton.  
Helen Hardy, a book-keeper with the firm, was slightly injured by flying glass but was able to return to work later in the day.  
Several other employees received a scare when the windows blew in with a crash, but none was injured.  
Instantly about a year ago during storm renovations the windows had previously withstood hurricane force winds.  
The fire department reported they poured some 2,500 gallons of water on the fire and surrounding buildings, trying to keep down the sparks which were being fanned by gale force winds. No cause for the blaze was given.

### Waterfront At Souris Sea-Battered

**SOURIS** — High winds accompanying yesterday's storm whipped up 10-foot waves over the breaker here and sent salt spray drizzling throughout the town.  
Winds last evening were estimated to have reached heights of 65 miles per hour.  
The waterfront received the most severe damage. Three small buildings used by lobster buyers were washed out to sea and two cranes located on the waterfront were at times submerged by the waves. One of the cranes overturned, but it was not learned last night whether the machine was damaged.  
At one point, a barge tied up at the dock broke loose, but it was recovered.  
The tide was level with the government wharf, which was covered with debris brought in by the waves.  
Winds also damaged gates, fences and doors, including the post office door, throughout the town.  
Ten telephone poles were blown down in the Bloomfield Station area. They were being replaced by a crew crew from the Charlottetown.  
Some phone circuits were reported out to Tignish and O'Leary.

The fisheries department vessel set out of Shelburne on the province's south coast Tuesday afternoon on route to the last known position of the Jean and Judy. But she was unable to make headway and was forced to turn for port, the high winds was mounting. Several p.m. boats were rammed ashore in waters near Halifax. Small fishing craft were battered all along the coast. The heaviest damage was expected to be to lobster gear along the Nova Scotia south and Fundy shores where the season has just opened.  
Up to 20 inches of snow fell in parts of the Maritimes Tuesday. Traffic was impassable as heavy rain. Trees were uprooted and basements flooded in the Halifax area. Traffic was snarled, bus service suspended and schools closed as a blizzard struck New Brunswick.  
John G. Starr, 58, of Shelburne, N.S., died of a seizure shortly after he was robbed.  
The two men aboard the lobster boat were identified as Phillip Quinlan and James Smith, both of Sionny Harbor, N.S. They left Port Monday to set lobster traps. Their engine failed and the boat's anchor failed to hold.  
Veteran navy men aboard the destroyer-escorts Terra Nova and Gaitane, which were sent to the area when the lobster boat failed to reach port, said they have seen the worst in memory. Some were as high as 90 feet, roughly the height of a five-story building.  
The storm roared into Cape Breton Tuesday night, knocking over power poles and plunging the entire island of 160,000 into darkness. The roof of a motel in central Cape Breton was ripped away and a highway in the same area was flooded and impassable. Plate glass windows in Sydney and surrounding towns were smashed by 90-mile-an-hour winds.  
Power company officials said the entire island of 160,000 people was without power, except for auxiliary generating stations at hospitals and other institutions and industries. The steel plant at Sydney was operating on auxiliary power.  
Dozens of power poles were toppled by winds up to 90 miles an hour.  
The roof of a motel at Baddeck, in central Cape Breton, was ripped off by gusting winds. Highway No. 5, impassable at Baddeck because of flooding caused by heavy rain.

### MV Belfast Arrives After 10-Hour Watch

The MV Belfast, one of the largest tankers to come to Charlottetown, arrived in port last night after battling gale force winds in the Northumberland Strait.  
The tanker, under master Martinus Ingebrigtsen arrived in harbor about 5:30 p.m. yesterday and stopped at the wharf of the railway wharf. She had been wayward two miles off St. Peter's Island since 7:30 yesterday morning and weighed anchor for Charlottetown at about 4:20 p.m.  
When she anchored in harbor a man with a safety line, consisting of 17,000 tons of gasoline and kerosene for the Imperial Oil plant here.  
She carries a crew of 44 and 11 officers, two of the crew members being women. She is owned by Belshaps Company and is registered in Oslo, Norway under charter by Imperial Oil. Her crew is of mixed nationalities.  
The ship will attempt to dock at the Railway Wharf early this morning.

Dr. Shumitcher To Appeal Case  
REGINA (CP) — Dr. M. C. Shumitcher Tuesday was granted leave to appeal his three-year conviction and sentence on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the public.  
The 47-year-old Regina lawyer was granted leave to appeal a \$15,000 fine and two years in jail. He was sentenced Monday in Saskatchewan.  
Chief Justice E. M. Culliton of Saskatchewan said in granting bail that Shumitcher's appeal of the next regular sitting of the Saskatchewan Court of Appeal, license was suspended against probably in March.
