New Flareup in Formosa Strait

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Communist MIG jet fighters shot down a Nationalist jet trainer Monday and attacked an unarmed amphibious commercial plane in a flareup of warfare over the Formosa strait. Chinese Nationalist air force headquarters said today intercepted intercom conversations between the MIGs indicated the pilots were Russians. The air force asserted also that fluent Russian was overheard in the directions from the ground to the attacking MIGs.

Bid Successful To Keep British Dock Strike Going

LONDON (REUTERS)—Banner-waving stevedores from northern England Monday blitzed the port of London with strike arguments and won in a bid to keep a walk-out going.

Three hundred members of the National Amalgamated Stevedores and Dockers Union travelled all night on buses from the strike-bound ports of Manchester, Liverpool and Birkenhead in a drive to win over London members of their union, who were wavering. The visiting contingents assembled early in the morning at the tower of London, then marched to the wharves of the world's second-largest port. Some formed picket lines, others paraded the streets shouting slogans to discourage London stevedores planning to return to their jobs.

currently fighting a growing shark menace. In a press release, the department disclosed the tiny fisheries protection vessel Comox Post had been fitted with a bow raper which has skinned 41 sharks—18 in one day. The new method, whereby the protection vessel hunts down a school of sharks and rams through with its bow knife, replaces the slower method of harpooning and the more dangerous practice of sniping. "Damage to gill nets and trolling gear through basking sharks has been a problem to fishermen for years," the release said. When not in use the pointed ram on the Comox Post is carried in an upright position, closed in the same manner as a class knife. When black fins are sighted the ram is lowered by a cable until it is running ahead of the ship, just below the waterline. The vessel charges into the school stabbing sharks or slashing them with the sharp edge of the ram. WIESBADEN, Germany. (CP)—Adolf Hartlieb, a 31-year-old laborer, Monday blew himself up, his wife and two children in a shack from which they were due to be evicted, police reported. All four were killed. An empty gasoline can was found. Police believe Hartlieb emptied the can and ignited the fumes.
