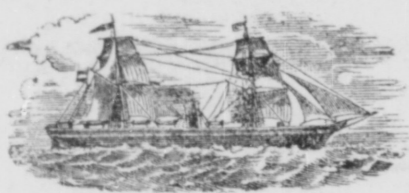


BLACK DIAMOND LINE.

THE MAIN QUESTION.

"Eternal Vigilance is the Price of Liberty."

The statute law of this Province may, perhaps, be so construed that Mr. Donald A. McKinnon may be Attorney General of this Province,—even though rejected of the people of Murray Harbor! But Mr. Donald A. McKinnon is Attorney General in violation of the principles of Responsible Government. An Attorney General, out of the Legislature, he stands singular and alone. There is not, we believe, and so far as we can learn, in any other part of any other free Colony of the British Empire, an Attorney General who is not also an elected representative of the people. Mr. McKinnon is in the closest possible relations with the Government. His advice upon all points of law must be taken by the Government. Yet he is not in any way responsible to the people.

Again, when the last general election was held in this Province, Mr. Frederick Peters, Q. C., was both Premier and Attorney General; and the people voted for the Government candidates throughout the Province in the belief that Mr. Peters would remain at the head of the Government. It was known that Mr. Peters stood well with Sir Louis Davies and other members of the Government of Canada; and Mr. Peters held out the expectation that he would successfully exert his influence to procure for the Government of Canada, by means of an arbitration or otherwise, the sum of one million dollars or more to be placed to the credit of the Province as an addition to the amount from which our annual Provincial subsidy is drawn. On the strength of this assurance the majority in the Province voted for the Peters Government. They did not vote, and never have voted, for the Farquharson Government or any member thereof; and, in four successive bye-elections the majority voted against the Farquharson Government candidates. The Farquharson Government is in office by a fluke. It is not representative of the people of this Province. It is not a representative government.

More than that, the Farquharson Government would not now be in office but for the treachery of Pineau! If Pineau had voted as he was elected to vote—as the majority in the first district of Prince County desired, and still desire that he should vote, Mr. Donald Farquharson and his followers would now be in the cool shades of opposition. The Government exists only by means of Pineau, who is a traitor to the majority of his constituents, whom he continues to misrepresent.
No? the question is, will a majority of the electors of the Second District of Queen's County vote for this irresponsible unrepresentative Government? If they prize responsible Government and desire to cherish representative institutions, they will not—they cannot do so. The first principles of responsible representative Government are at stake in this election.

NORTH RIVER MEETING.

Mr. Wise's Satisfactory Statement Convinces the Electors.

A large audience greeted the candidates and their supporters at North River on Saturday night. Mr. Howard was appointed chairman. The time for the candidates was limited to 30 minutes, and 20 minutes was assigned to every other speaker.

Mr. Wise was the first speaker. He made a capital speech, and was listened to attentively. He fully and satisfactorily explained the reasons of his leaving the Liberal party, and exposed the Premier's duplicity in obtaining the two resignations. He charged the Premier with suppressing the condition and although the condition is admitted by the Premier to be still in the hands of Arthur Newbury, the Clerk of the Executive Council, he (the Premier) could not explain Mr. Wise's charge that the condition was to be carried out by the Government and the election held before the House met. He charged Mr. Farquharson with sending delegations to him to obtain his support after he had repeatedly told him that he had left the party. He justified his action by the unfulfillment of the Government policy respecting arbitration and for other valid reasons. He did not leave them without notice as he had voted with the Opposition on a want of confidence motion in the session of 1898. Strong inducements were held out to him but he spurned them. He now appealed to the electors on the record of the Government, and he showed clearly that their policy of piling up the debt if followed will end in irretrievable ruin to the province. Mr. Wise was followed by Dr. Douglas, Messrs A. A. McLean, D. Farquharson, Cyrus Shaw, A. Peters, D. A. McKinnon, James McLean and Dr. Taylor.

An unusual number of camp followers, drawn from the Registry Office, the Land Department, Supervisors and road machine manipulators were in evidence at the meeting, but to the credit of the electors of North River they were prevented from getting in the work they evidently (by their actions) were there to perform, and the best of order prevailed throughout the entire meeting.

WHEATLEY RIVER MEETING.

The meeting at Wheatley River yesterday afternoon was overwhelmingly Conservative, and Mr. Wise was given a hearty reception.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. Albert McKay, and the speakers were Dr. Douglas, Mr. Wise, Mr. J. F. Wear, Mr. A. A. McLean, Mr. Farquharson and Mr. Cyrus Shaw, in the order in which the names are given.

NEW GLASGOW MEETING.

The meeting at New Glasgow was the largest of the campaign, and there was great enthusiasm over Mr. Wise, the Liberal Conservative candidate. James Dickieson was chairman, and the meeting was addressed in turn, by the following gentlemen: Joseph Wise, Dr. Douglas, Mr. A. A. McLean, Mr. W. Campbell, Mr. J. F. Wear, Mr. Thomas Doble, Mr. William Laird, Mr. Ernest Harris, Mr. W. McCoubrey, Mr. A. McCoubrey, Premier Farquharson and Mr. Cyrus Shaw.

Departure of Mr. D. McNeill—Address From Associate Officials.

D. McNEILL, City.

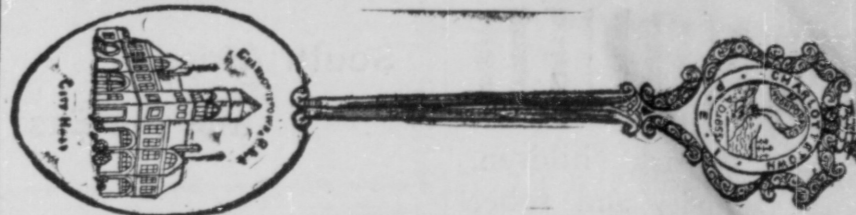
