**Islanders-Glace Bay Given The Go Ahead**

HALIFAX, Dec. 12 — (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders and Glace Bay Miners of the Maritime Major Hockey League were given the go ahead tonight to play each other after league president J. Elliott Hudson was assured that proper police protection will be provided.

Mr. Hudson, who earlier banned games between the two clubs, said: "The managements of the Charlottetown and Glace Bay Forums have assured me that they both will have sufficient and adequate police protection for future games in their rinks. In view of their written assurances games between the Islanders and Miners hockey clubs can continue to be played in Charlottetown and Glace Bay."

Mr. Hudson ruled out games between the two teams last week after an outbreak of rough play and fan interference at the rinks.

Mr. Hudson's statement continued: "Both forums have given me their complete co-operation in the matter and I hope and believe that there will be no further trouble. However, as stated in my letters of Dec. 8, if the police protection does not prove to be adequate, the referees will have been ordered to stop a game and award it to the visiting club."

"I am calling on all fans who attend games in Charlottetown and Glace Bay to be true sportsmen and act as such. I am also informing both coaches that I will expect them to control their players. If they are unable to do so, they can expect to be dealt with severely."

"I am also again reminding the referees that they have been ordered to enforce all hockey rules most thoroughly."

At the dinner meeting short speeches were given by Councillor W. H. Beaton, representing His Worship Mayor Stewart; Dr. L. W. Snow, Director of Education; Walter Lawlor, President of the M. A. H. A.; George Hayes, Leo Lamoureux and Doug Crossman of Albany who thanked the instructors on behalf of the school.

**New Candidates**

Several new candidates were on hand yesterday for the instructions and two of them Gregory Gavin and Charlie McInnis motored down from Tignish to attend the school.

In speaking about the conduct of a referee or linesman Mr. Hayes stated that they should never bend over the boards and talk to fans or wisecrack with the players. He also advised against talking with the players but added that a referee should never walk away from a player who sits down beside him and wants to talk.

He stated that referees should look smart and neat at all times. "When you give a signal put life into it," he said that the wearing apparel of an official, that of black pants, white sweater and black tie, was the most satisfactory for the job with the possible exclusion of the tie.

He reminded the candidates never to make any derogatory remarks about another official with whom they had been working and he asked the members to aid young referees as much as possible. Mr. Hayes recalled that when he was launching his career as a referee he received loads of assistance from "Rabbit MacVeigh and "King" Clancy.

The afternoon session was supposed to conclude at five o'clock but it was well past that time when the period broke up. The bull session about big time hockey was in progress with George in the chair and the candidates were making the most of it as they heaped question upon question upon their instructor.

**Biggest Thrill**  
 Asked about his biggest thrill as an official George replied that it came in the Memorial Cup finals in 1946 between Winnipeg Monarchs and Toronto St. Mike's. He was asked to step in during the series, which was probably the best junior series ever played. This opportunity to officiate was also his biggest break, he stated.

As a parting shot to the candidates he told them that they had only learned the rules from him and now it was up to them to apply them. "Refereeing is mainly a matter of judgment," he said. He reminded them to take advantage

of every opportunity they received to officiate regardless of the league or the pay.

The movies depicted scenes from the Stanley Cup semi-finals between Toronto and Boston and the finals between the Leafs and Canadiens. They were shown twice in the afternoon and again at the dinner meeting. John Martin of the National Film Board ran the film projector.

The dinner meeting was presided over by Brigadier W. W. Reid, Director of the Department of Physical Fitness, which sponsored the school. The gifts to the instructors were presented by Dr. Lloyd Shaw on behalf of the Department.

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
