NEW YORK, Dec. 26 (CP) - The Canadian dollar was down 1-8 of a cent at a discount of 5 1/2 per cent in terms of United States funds in closing foreign exchange dealings today. The pound sterling was down 1-16 of a cent at \$2.80 1-16.

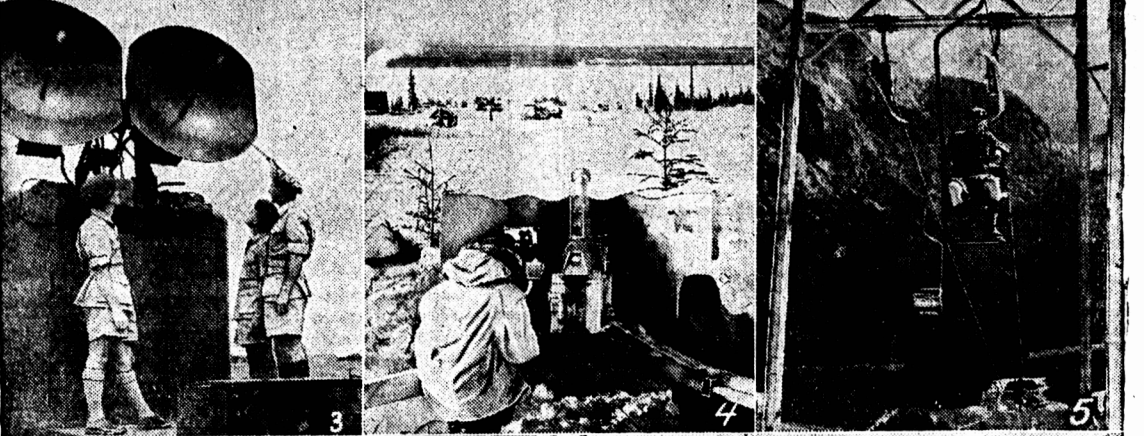
Milk Production

OTTAWA, Dec. 26 (CP) - Milk production on Canadian farms in October totalled 1,287,465,000 pounds, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. Compared with 1,417,745,000 in October last year, in the 10-month period production totalled 14,354,131,000 pounds, compared with 14,589,224,000 a year earlier. Advance reports indicate production was about nine per cent lower in November than in November last year, the Bureau said. The dairy butter make in October amounted to 3,465,000 pounds down 21 per cent from the corresponding month last year. All Provinces contributed to the decrease except New Brunswick. In the cumulative period, 36,790,000 pounds of dairy butter were produced, a decline of 6,851,000 pounds from last year.

Egg Production

OTTAWA, Dec. 26 (CP) - Canadian hens laid 23,838,000 dozen eggs in November against 26,248,000 a year ago. The Bureau of Statistics reported today this raised the cumulative total for the first 11 months of this year to 323,168,000 dozen against 313,298,000 in the corresponding period of 1949. The rate of lay in November was slightly lower than a year earlier, amounting to 934 eggs a 100 layers, compared with 963 eggs. Average number of laying hens on farms was 30,407,000 against 30,895,000.

As seasonal festivities draw to a close and the year 1950 comes to an end, members of the Canadian Army look back on what proved to be the busiest twelve months ever encountered in peacetime. Their most important job was the raising of a force for service under United Nations command. In the short space of four months a 10,000 man brigade was recruited, trained, and sent to the United States and Korea where they are now undergoing advanced battle training. Early in the year more than 3,000 Canadian and U. S. troops and airmen combined to carry out Exercise Sweetbriar along the Alaska Highway system. During May, over 4,000 active and reserve force troops from across Canada were sent to the Red River Valley to fight the rampaging Manitoba flood waters. Military camps across Canada were kept busy during the summer months with an influx of nearly 22,000 personnel for annual training. They were members of the Reserve Forces, Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps, and the Canadian Officer Training Corps.
