High Standard Maintained, P.E.I. Militia Group Is Told

"I think you maintained and probably surpassed the high standard I saw at last year's inspection," Major-General M.P. Bogart, CBE, DSO, CD, general officer commanding Eastern Army Command, told members of 2 Militia Group following the annual inspection last night.

General Bogart singled out the bands of the P.E.I. Regiment and Queen Charlotte High School which accompanied the militia on parade for special praise. "Both bands," he said, "contributed a great deal to the parade, and both are of a high standard."

"The Canadian Militia," he

pointed out "has played an important part in the life of this country and no doubt it will continue to do so in the future."

Accompanying General Bogart on his inspection and ceremonial review were Lt.-Cols. S.C. Waters, J.K.S. Manuel and M.C. Sutherland-Brown, all senior staff officers from the army's Halifax headquarters.

Lt. D.S. Manuel, son of Co. 1 Manuel, served as aide de camp to the general.

TWO DECORATIONS

One of the highlights of the presentation of decorations to nine militia members by General Bo-

gart following the inspection was the awarding of both the Canadian Forces Decoration and the Efficiency Medal to Sgt. W.M. King. It was pointed out that this double presentation is a rare occurrence.

Others receiving the Canadian Forces Decoration included: Captains E.G. Kerr and W.W.S. Veale; RSM (WO1) C.E. Ryan, SSM (WO2) H. J. Coffin, SSM George Schlyer Staff Sergeant E.N. Gorvett, J.A. Gallant, and Sergeant Robert Walton.

Hundreds of the city's citizens turned out to see the parade which was under the command of Lt.-Col. R.M. Johnson, ED. The P.E.I. Regiment was under the command of Lt.-Col. John A. Macdonald, CD, the 5 Signals Regiment was under Lt.-Col. F. S. Jenkins, C.D., and 5 Medical Company was commanded by Lt.-Col. H.P. Stewart, CD.

Commanding officer of 2 Militia Group is Col. A.W. Rogers, ED. The band of the P.E.I. Regiment was under the direction of Lt. C.E. MacGregor while Bandsman IVO Cudmore directed the QCHS band.

Personnel of 5 Provost Company were employed as police markers along the route of the parade.
